

Local and Other Items.

The rain was a great "benefit." H. L. McDONALD, M. P., is visiting the city. The watering carts were out early this morning—sure sign of rain. Mr. John Ross is engaged in numbering the doors fronting on our streets. One drunk at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning. Paid the usual fine. A horse put his foot through the planking on Pownal Wharf this morning, but escaped without injury. The twelfth of July promises to be a lively day at Ottawa. Three thousand Orangemen intend to march through the streets. Mr. C. L. BRIDGES is fitting up the rear of his shop on Hillsborough Street as a fish market for the use of fishermen selling and the public buying. The steamer Carroll ran aground twenty-five miles below Hawkesbury on Friday night. A passing tug towed her off next morning without damage. The Rev. Dr. Walker, P. P., of Rollo Bay, has come on a short visit to the United States and Upper Provinces. We wish him a pleasant trip and safe return. Mr. Geo. A. SHARPE, of the P. E. Island Railway, left this morning for a week's angling in the Cascapedia. We wish Mr. Sharpe a pleasant and successful trip. The regular monthly meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society will be held in their Hall, Prince Street, this (Monday) evening, at 8 o'clock.—John Connolly, Secretary. CIVIL ENGINEERS to make a further survey of the Strait between the Capes, with a view to the construction of the proposed Subway, are expected to arrive here this evening. A GENTLEMAN just returned from Cape Breton states that many of the crops there have been almost completely blighted by the drought. Hay will be a very poor crop in our sister Island. The Rev. Mr. Bishop, B. A., St. John, N. B., is preaching at present to the East Point Baptist Congregation. There is some talk of giving him a call to the church there, that is, providing he will accept the call. It is said that the Committee of Management have decided upon having the Hon. D. Gordon to lay the cornerstone of the new Court House, on the 14th. No better choice could be made, as no man in King's County stands higher in public estimation than the senior member for Georgetown. The Rev. Mr. Wass, who has been laboring on the Souris circuit for the last two years, preached his farewell sermon on Sunday last. He goes to West Point. During his stay in Souris he has made many friends, and he leaves the circuit with the good wishes of every one, without distinction of creed. The Saturday Gazette, of St. John, N. B., in commenting on the recent Margate murder, says: "Prince Edward Island seems to monopolise sensations of this kind. There have been a good many murders on the Island within a few years. We protest against such a grossly false statement by our contemporary. It is, to say the least, unjust that such a reflection should be cast on this Province. ATTENTION is directed to the Royal Proclamation in this day's issue of THE EXAMINER, in which Her Majesty the Queen—in observance of her jubilee—extends pardon to all deserters from the regular, militia or reserve forces who shall comply with the simple terms therein set out. We hope that there are not many in P. E. Island, to avail themselves of the terms offered, but all who are should not fail to take advantage of the Queen's pardon. We regret to learn of the death of Miss Sophia Stanlake, aged 20 years, daughter of Mr. John Stanlake, of this city, which occurred very suddenly in Boston, on the 8th inst. Miss Stanlake was much esteemed by all who knew her, and went to Boston about three years ago, where she made many friends. She had intended to come home next Saturday for a holiday; but, instead, her body will be brought by the Worcester-to-morrow evening. Her funeral will be from St. Peter's Church on Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. We tender our sympathy to her bereaved parents. Mr. A. D. FRASER, Principal of the North Bedouque School for the last four years, having demitted his charge, the members of Wellington Division, S. of T. of which he was an honored member, gave him a pleasant send-off in the shape of a basket social on Tuesday, 5th inst. Complimentary speeches were made by Brothers J. Carruthers, L. U. Fowler, J. McCaul and others. Brother Fraser responded, thanking the members, especially the sisters, for the unique yet pleasant manner in which his stay in North Bedouque was brought to a close. The speeches were interspersed with choice music, Brother Fowler giving one of his best readings in his inimitable style. After the contents of the baskets had changed places, Brother Woolley spoke in glowing terms of the sterling worth of the guest of the evening. The meeting came to a close by singing Auld Lang Syne and God Save the Queen. MAN DROWNED.—A correspondent at Georgetown writes: "It is feared that a stranger, giving the name of 'Wiltshire,' from Charlottetown, has been drowned in Thomson's mill dam at Albion Bay, near Lower Montague. On Saturday evening, the 9th, he crossed the ferry from Georgetown, had a white horse with harness on, having previously left his wagon at McCornack's hotel. In the wagon was a set of harness which had never been used. From his manner it was apparent that his mind was unsettled in some way. On Sunday morning, the 10th, Mr. Young, of Albion Bay, was surprised to find the horse with harness attached in his field, giving indications of having had a terrible struggle in the mill pond. The dam is very broad, over 600 feet, and contains trees, stumps and debris of all kinds, and it is a matter of surprise how the horse succeeded in getting clear. Mr. Thomson and Mr. Young are preparing torches and collecting a party to 'drag' and search the pond, as they have no doubt whatever of the man being drowned." [There has been for several years a man named Wiltshire in the employ of the Rev. David Fitzgerald. It is thought that the man supposed to be drowned is the same. Wiltshire is absent somewhere in the country.]

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Wreck of the "Merrimack."

NO PARTICULARS PASSENGERS SAVED!

HALIFAX, July 10. A special despatch from Liverpool announces that the splendid passenger steamer Merrimack, Capt. Crowell, of the Boston, Halifax and P. E. Island line, which sailed from this port Saturday afternoon for Boston, with two hundred passengers, is a total wreck at Little Hope Island. The passengers have been saved. No details of the disaster have been received. It was a splendid moonlight night in this city, and surprise is expressed at the wreck. [The Merrimack left here last Thursday with a cargo of eggs, lobsters, mackerel and other produce valued at \$8,000, which is supposed to be partly insured, and the following passengers: Misses Connor, McKenna and Cameron, M. Delhunter, W. Meathen, Judge Alley, Mrs. Alley, Miss Alley. All the passengers are, as far as we can learn, safe, but the cargo, it is feared, will be totally lost. The Merrimack was commanded by Capt. Crowell and was first put on this route last summer. She made a few trips and then, owing to an accident, which happened to the Gate City, she was taken off again, and now this summer on her first trip she is wrecked. The Merrimack was the finest ship on the route, was quite popular and has been up to the present time, very lucky.]

Town Burned.

Eleven Persons Cremated Alive

MILWAUKEE, July 10. At Hurley, Wis., a fire broke out in State of Alcazar Theatre, at 8 o'clock, last night, and within an hour the entire business part of the town was in flames. Eleven persons perished in the theatre, and the charred remains of nine people were taken from the ruins. The loss is fully half a million. The Alcazar was a variety theatre, chiefly frequented by miners. When the fire broke out the audience scrambled out, but several actors rushed upstairs to save their wardrobe, and when they sought escape were hemmed in on all sides and perished in the flames.

Presentation to Gladstone.

LONDON, July 10. On Saturday afternoon at Dallas Hill, in the presence of a large number of guests, invited by Mr. Gladstone to a garden party, the American testimonial to Gladstone was formally presented and afterwards exhibited to the guests. The presentation speech was made by Joseph Pulitzer, of the New York World. The box, a massive piece of silverwork, was most carefully examined by Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone. Mr. Gladstone spoke with great deliberation and feeling of the kindness always manifested towards him by the Americans. He prophesied a speedy victory for Home Rule.

Terrible Work in Ireland.

DUBLIN, July 10. In the evictions at Cool Grainery, County Waterford, Saturday, a man named Darcy and his three daughters made such a stubborn defence of their house against the bailiffs who attempted to eject them that the officers struck the girls and badly injured one. The bailiffs were arrested, charged with assault.

A Madman on the Rampage.

DUBLIN, July 10. A madman, on Saturday, attacked a party making hay. The lunatic, who was armed with a bill hook, killed four men and wounded two. He was captured, standing up to his chin in a neighboring lake.

Heavy Libel Suit.

MONTEAL, July 10. The Richelieu, Ont., Navigation Co. have taken action for \$25,000 damages against the Montreal Star, on the alleged ground of damaging statements which appeared in that paper.

More Quaking.

CHARLESTON, S. C., July 10. A slight earthquake shock was felt in different parts of Lower South Carolina this afternoon.
