Mrs. Harris chose for her daughter's wedding a two-piece dress of grey bengaline with Coronation red accessories and a corsage of red carnations.

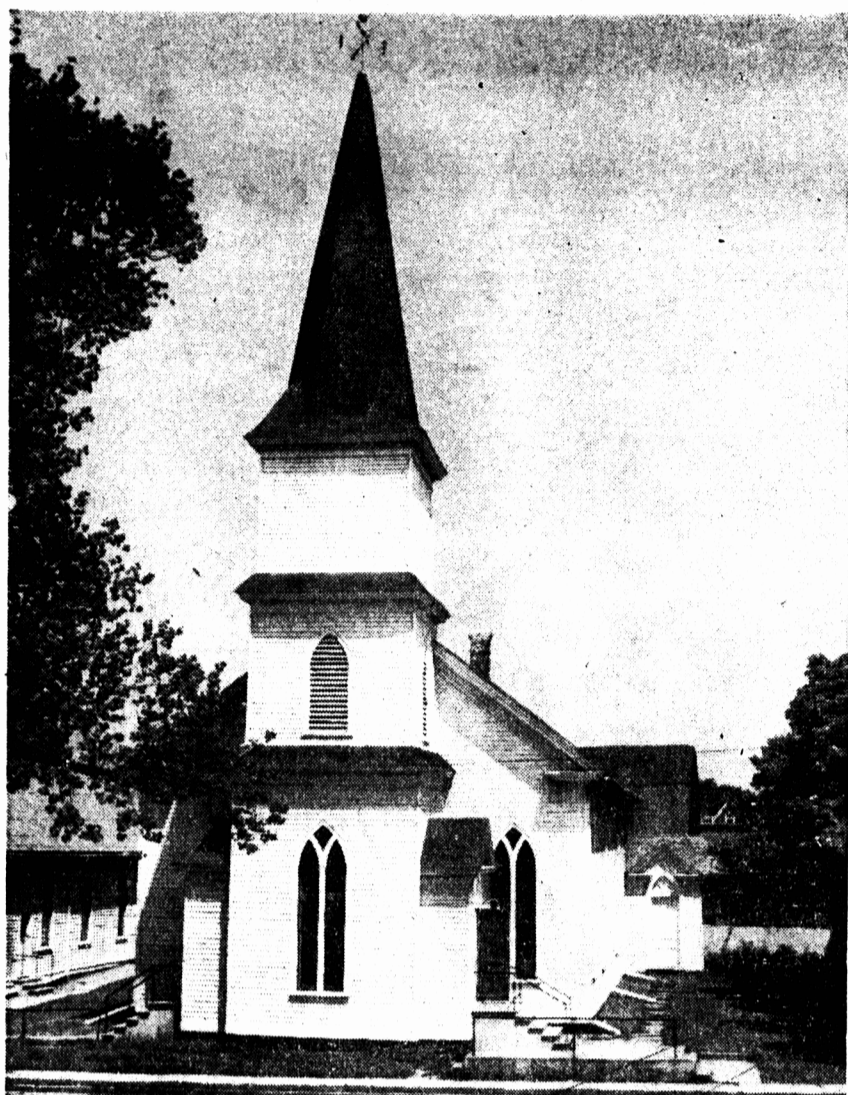

One Hundredth Anniversary Of The Summerside Presbyterian Church



The one hundredth anniversary of the Summerside Presbyterian Church, the oldest church building in the town will be observed on Sunday next, June 28. The church was formally dedicated on March 19, 1865, with Rev. R. S. Patterson of Bedeque, Rev. W. R. Frame of Isaac Murray of Cavendish officiating.

Presbyterian worship began at Green's Shore, now Summerside, about 1853, with Rev. J. M. MacLeod of Richmond Bay and Rev. R. S. Patterson conducting services on alternate Sabbaths in a twelve foot square room of a private home in front of where the old hospital building now stands.

At this time there were but 12 houses at Green's Shore with no church or school. When the school was erected both Presbyterians and Methodists worshipped there, and this building still stands at the west end of the town and is now in use as a grocery store.

The growth in population became so phenomenal, attracted by the ship-building and the bi-weekly communication with the mainland, that the congregation soon outgrew its quarters. In 1854 Brown's Hall was used until the present church was completed. The members of the P. E. I. Presbytery in 1856 purchased a lot of land from Mr. Joseph Green, but it was not until 1862 that the foundation of the church was laid and three years later completed. The lumber was hauled from Welland's Point. The committee who supervised the building consisted of Messrs R. Glover, Thomas Brehaut, James Muirhead and Colin MacLennan.

The church was constructed during the greatest missionary era of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The pioneer missionary, Rev. John Geddies, then on furlough, preached here in 1865. This congregation was included, at first, in the Richmond Bay parish and later was attached to Lot 16 when Rev. W. R. Frame was inducted as pastor. The elders at that time were: Messrs. Anthony Craswell, George Linkletter, Roderick MacLean and Hugh Carr.

In 1871 the Summerside church became a separate charge and a Bill of Incorporation, sponsored by Hon. James Muirhead, passed the Legislature on March 17. The first Board of Trustees comprised Messrs. William Brehaut, Robert Glover, Thomas B. Hall, William Henry Brown and David Montgomery. Rev. Neil MacKay, the first resident minister was inducted in 1873 and labored acceptably for 13 years. The church was enlarged during his pastorate to accommodate 200 additional adherents. The finances were procured by each family paying for its respective pew.

The early church records were destroyed by fire on the first P. E. I. icebreaker, The Northern Light, which plied between Georgetown, P. E. I., and Pictou, N. S. The steamer, caught in an ice jam, was held up for one month, and the fuel became exhausted, making it necessary to burn a portion of the cargo and all books and papers. Among the latter were the valuable church papers of Rev. Neil MacKay, who was on his way to attend Presbytery in Nova Scotia.

A New act of incorporation was passed in 1863 and the following trustees were elected: Messrs William H. Brown, Joseph Linkletter, Theophilus J. Clark, Daniel Stewart, Neil Sinclair, David Montgomery and Neil MacKelvie. After the resignation of Rev.

Neil MacKay, Rev. J. P. Gerrior, known as the singing evangelist, was inducted and remained for one year. The Summerside Presbyterian Church had always been a missionary church and in 1889 when she was supporting a home missionary in British Columbia, the people there, in gratefulness to this congregation named their village Summerside, B. C.

Rev. Henry Dickie, the next pastor, was inducted in 1888. During his ministry of six years, the Sunday School hall was erected and dedicated in 1891. His resignation was accepted with deep regret and sorrow. Rev. E. M. Dill, D. D., succeeded until 1898 when Rev. W. H. Smith, Ph. D., the able

On the north wall of the church is a plaque in memory of the following men of this congregation who gave their lives in the Great War of 1914-18: William Bishop, Herbery Gay, Thomas C. Hierlby, James Hacker, Pope Howatt, Claude Milligan, Allen McLeod, John C. McLeod, James M. MacKay, Stirling MacKay, E. Gordon Phillips, George W. Sharp.

Another plaque is in loving memory of Theophilus D. Ramsay and his wife, Emma J. Caldwell, who devoted their lives to the welfare of the church. Through the years the church has been decorated within and without. The ground was enlarged by the removal of the old horse shed which had accommodated so many horses owned by members from outlying districts. Recently the aisles of the church were carpeted and the steeple of the church repaired, it having previously been damaged by lightning.

In June 1952, the Young Adult Group solicited the congregation for funds to enlarge and modernize the Sunday School Hall. During August of the same year work commenced, and in February, 1953, the project was completed. The congregation now have a beautiful Sunday School and auditorium where the several church groups and societies meet. The congregation has steadily increased in membership. In all its work and activities this church nobly maintains the tradition of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Judgment In Damages Case At Summerside

At a special sitting of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday Mr. Justice Mark MacGuigan delivered judgment in favor of the plaintiff, Arthur Ramsay Est. for the amount of \$514.05 and costs and at the same time dismissed a counter claim of the defendant Glen Matthews. In a similar action, Mr. Justice MacGuigan gave judgment for the plaintiff, Hilton Hardy for the amount of \$705.56 and costs. These actions were commenced as the result of an accident west of Alberton on October 1, 1952, involving cars owned by Arthur Ramsay, Alberton, Hilton Hardy, Charlottetown, and a truck owned by Glen Matthews of Alberton.
