Chest X-Ray Scheduled At Montague Soon

The people of Montague will have an opportunity for a free chest X-ray on Thursday and Friday, Oct. 12th and 13th, when the Tuberculosis League's mobile clinic will set up in the Town. It was July 1948 when the clinic was last here and a good response was given to it.

Tentative plans are that the unit will visit the High School on Thursday during the school hours to x-ray the students by classes. For the convenience of residents the League plans to set up in two places, one north of the river and later on the south. To make it easy for the north portion of the town a clinic will be held on Thursday evening from 7:00 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. at the High School. On Friday the clinic will set up at the Guardian office on the south side of Montague from 11:30 to 12:30, 4:30 to 5:30, and from 7:00 to 9:00 P.M.

With all these alternative opportunities presented to the people it is hoped that a really large attendance will result. The TB League officials express their objective as being an attendance of 450, including school students. As a community health project surely this figure can be exceeded.
