THE barquentine "Ethel Blanche," owned by Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co., encountered very heavy weather on her recent passage to Liverpool. The captain reports that on the 4th ult., an ordinary seaman—Charles Owen—aged eighteen, fell overboard and was drowned. On the 7th, at two o'clock a. m., latitude 48 north, and longitude 30 west, they experienced a very heavy gale. The vessel shipped a sea aft which carried away half the wheel, and Michael Creamer, the first mate. It also carried off the binnacle and compass, broke in the companion doors and burst the skylight, and also carried away part of the deck and one of the flywheels of the pump. He was obliged to lay to until the weather moderated. The young seaman Owen, who was drowned on the 4th December, belonged to England. He was on his first passage, and previous to shipping had run away from his parents. The mate was a native of Cologne.

Floods in Europe. LONDON, Jan. 5. Floods in Europe continue to cause trouble and destruction along the Rhine and Danube Rivers.

The Revenue. OTTAWA, Jan. 5. The Revenue of the Dominion of Canada for the month of December is \$2,480,764, an increase over the same period of last year of \$161,793.

The Cedar Grove Investigation. HALIFAX, Jan. 5. Capt. Scott, R. N., reports to the Marine Department that, from the evidence taken in the recent investigation, he must exonerate the officers of the "Cedar Grove," from all blame in the loss of the steamer.

Beaten to Death. DUBLIN, Jan. 5. A farmer named Carney was beaten to death at Claremorris, yesterday.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Jan. 3. Mr. Smith, Colliery owner of Swanses, has failed; liabilities £60,000.

WIESBADEN, Jan. 3. Ten thousand persons have been rendered homeless by floods in districts near Worms, and they are in danger of starvation.

MANHEIM, Jan. 3. The great Rhine dam gave way to-night. A steamer and forty-five boats rescued the people by torchlight. The village of Triensheim been deserted and a third of the inhabitants of Appau have abandoned their homes.

VIENNA, Jan. 3. The Danube has risen to a height of 470 centimetres. A large railway bridge over the Danube has been demolished.

DUBLIN, Jan. 3. Delaney to-day was found guilty of conspiracy to murder Judge Lawson and sentenced to ten years' penal servitude.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 3. The coronation of the Czar will probably take place in April.

PARIS, Jan. 3. The funeral of Gambetta has been postponed until Saturday morning.

MEYANES, Jan. 3. The Rhine has reached a height of 5.76 meters. With great efforts a tramway has been laid to bring earth for the construction of a dam.

ROBSTADT, Jan. 3. This town, with the exception of the church and the houses of the clergy, is deeply submerged, the water in many houses nearly reached the roofs. In Friesenheim on the Rhine the scene beggars description.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3. Peruvian advices, via Panama, state that it is understood that Pierola will not return to Peru. U. S. Minister Logan is reported to be continuing to work for peace. Chilean papers publish President Arthur's comments on the war, and the neutrals consider that his declarations will have a pacifying effect, and that Chileans will work more energetically in the direction of peace. Pierola may be considered as having lost political influence, and not to be dangerous as an enemy of peace. Great Britain, Italy and France have signed an agreement, under which the claims of this subject for damages during the war will be investigated and determined. The commission extends two years, and all awards made by it are to be covered by Chili within one year. Germany will probably go in the convention. The total claims reach an enormous amount.

PARIS, Jan. 3. Grimbetta's family has consented to a State funeral on condition that the body be eventually removed to Nice. Fifteen professors and physicians performed an autopsy of the body of Gambetta. After it was completed, the embalming process was begun. The French Government will devote 20,000 francs to meet cost of funeral. At the autopsy the top of the head was removed and the brain extracted. The latter will be given to the Anthropological Society. The official report of the autopsy shows that there had been a long standing inflammation of the bowels, which led to the contraction of the small intestines, bringing about infiltration in the rear of the colon in the very wall of the abdomen.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR. IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.' I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councillman in the City Council for each Ward of said City, Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILLMEN, will be held on WEDNESDAY, the 24th Day of January, A. D. 1883. At the several places, that is to say: In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets. In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heartz's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets. In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Easton and Great George Streets. And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. DESCRIPTION OF WARDS. Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground. Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street. Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town. NOMINATION DAY. Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15.—"Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councillors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates." There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of five dollars which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid. The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
