

Northland Development Scheme For B. C. Offered

VICTORIA (CP)—One of the world's wealthiest men has presented the British Columbia government with a plan that could lead to the development of a large portion of the province's unsettled northland.

The project has the financial support of Axel L. Wenner-Gren, 75-year-old Swedish financier.

Government officials here say the idea was born in conversations 2½ years ago between Wenner-Gren and B.C. officials and W. A. McAdam, B.C. agent-general in London.

The multi-million-dollar scheme was outlined in the B.C. legislature late Tuesday by Lands and Forests Minister Ray Williston.

In effect, Wenner-Gren has offered to build a 400-mile monorail railway in return for first chance at staking minerals, timber stands and hydro-electric power developments in an area more than one-third of the entire province.

"There is every indication that this corporation means business," Mr. Williston said, "already three survey contracts have been let totalling more than \$3,000,000."

As an illustration of good faith, Wenner-Gren deposited \$500,000 with the B. C. government. It would be returned upon satisfactory proof that the \$5,000,000 allocated for surveys had been spent, or in the event the B.C. government found the plans for northern development were unsatisfactory.

Prince George, 465 miles north of Vancouver and in the geographical centre of the province, would be the gateway to the vast development.

The continental-type monorail railway would be built from Port McLeod, 65 miles north of Prince George, the Pacific Great Eastern Railway's northern terminus, to the Yukon border.

WOULD BUILD MILL

The Wenner-Gren B.C. Development Co. Ltd., which has been incorporated to handle the surveys, said it the scheme is carried through at least one pulp mill of not less than 100,000 tons annual capacity would be built; also sawmills, hydro-electric power units, townships, roads, hospitals and schools, including technical institutions.

The Vancouver Province says completion of the project could cost nearly \$1,000,000,000.

In the memorandum of agreement read by Mr. Williston in the legislature, the Wenner-Gren interests said the survey would be completed by the end of 1958 and construction of the railway started not later than April 1, 1960.

Wenner-Gren, 75, has been surrounded by an air of conflicting reports which led to his being termed an "international mystery man" in Canadian and United States newspapers.

He started his multi-million-dollar empire in 1925 when he spearheaded development of a vacuum sweeper. He later turned to refrigerator production, bought into Swedish armament and airplane concerns, and took over control of the Swedish pulp and paper trust.

District Governor Jack Walsh of St. John's, Newfoundland, made his official visit to the Summerside Lions Club at a dinner meeting of Lions and Lionettes held last evening in the Summerlee Restaurant and presided over by program chairman Ralph Casely.

Mr. Walsh, who was introduced by president Russell Kelly, stated it was difficult to choose a subject on which to speak because "Before a club as active as this, it hardly believe it is necessary for me to tell Lionsism."

Mr. Walsh, who impressed the meeting with his sincerity, stressed the remarkable amount of work done by the Lions throughout this district, 41-N, which he said is not fully realized by a great many. He told of the wonderful fellowship and of the good will that is cemented between the Lions International convention. He attended the most recent gathering which was held at Miami, Florida with Lions from nearly every country in the world.

The guest speaker stated that he was the first Newfoundland to hold the district governor's job for 41-N and the last, due to the fact that the district is being split up as it is much too large at present. Newfoundland, he said, would constitute one district and he related the travel problems that beset him during the past year because of the long distances between Newfoundland and mainland points and also of the winter travelling conditions in his home Province.

Mr. Walsh, who is a talented entertainer, was a singer with the Canadian Army Show during the Second World War and fittingly concluded his remarks with the words of the song "No Man Is An Island" which he said are so applicable to the principles of Lionsism.

Following his address Mr. Walsh, assisted Mr. Herb Schurman, deputy district governor conducted an induction ceremony at which 19 new members received membership in the club.

Currie, who welcomed the district governor on behalf of the council and the citizenry, Mrs. Currie, Ernest Matheson, president of the Charlottetown Club, and Mrs. Matheson, zone chairman John Van Marion and Mrs. Van Marion. NINTY REPORT

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S'ide Town Council Given Report On New Air Fire Horn

Reporting for the fire and police committee at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council held Monday night, Councillor W.E. Jenkins said that he had prepared a report on the new air fire horn which gave a detailed account of the fire alarm system now in use in the town of Summerside.

Councillor Jenkins said that "During the latter months of 1955 the Fire Department appointed from among its members a special committee to make a study and bring in a recommendation relative to the existing fire alarm system. This committee was composed of Mr. Heath Warren, chairman, the fire chief deputy fire chief and Messrs. John Schurman and George Hogg. During the ensuing weeks the committee gathered pertinent information and held several meetings on the subject from which meeting progress reports were made to the regular monthly meetings of the fire Department where the subject was discussed in detail and eventually the recommendation of the special committee to request the Town Council to install a Northern Electric diaphone air horn was concurred in by the Fire Department.

On April 9th at a duly called meeting of the town council, the Town Council's approval was granted for the purchase and installation of the recommended air horn by a resolution of Councillors Jenkins and Lidstone and this recommendation received the full support of the whole council.

It was pointed out that manufacturers of the horn were reputable and the agents were an old established firm in both Canada and the United States and had installed similar horns in many towns in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

SYSTEM ORDERED

The fire alarm system was duly ordered from the Northern Electric Company who in turn requested cooperation in making a test of the alarm in the town prior to carrying out the installation and this test was made on June 29th, 1956, in several locations, one of which was the present location. In attendance at this test was Fire Chief Heath Warren and J.A.C. Schurman of the fire committee, Councillor Cannon who supplied the air compressor used in the test and representatives of the Northern Electric Company, including their fire alarm engineer, Mr. M. S. MacLean.

Subsequently, in a letter to Mr. Warren, this engineer commented on the apparent success of the tests made in the various locations in Summerside and suggested that the old electric siren be placed on the roof of the town office building and the new equipment mounted on a steel tower placed on the roof of the Fire Hall, thereby allowing the air horn an elevation of some forty feet to fifty-feet above the ground, which is considered the recommended height for good results. He also outlined five other benefits accruing through the installation of this location.

Rather than have the Northern Electric make the installation, the fire committee engaged Mr. E.A. Cochrane of Sussex, N.B., an experienced man in this field and upon his arrival in Summerside he recommended and decided to make the installation within the town office building with the fire horn placed on the roof deck surrounding the clock tower with the resonator pointing to the north.

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RURAL DENTAL CLINIC

One of many children who has received complete dental treatment provided by the Public Health Dental Clinic is seen at the conclusion of her visit talking with the dentist, Dr. Robert G. Romcke, and his assistant, Miss Eleanor Peters, at their winter headquarters in the Summerside Health Centre, in the building formerly known as the Old Prince County Hospital on Central Street.

In the months of spring, summer, and fall, the Dental Clinic becomes mobile and operates in rural centres in various parts of the Province.

All these rural clinics all children in grade 1 and grade 2 can receive complete dental treatment. When this treatment has been completed it is hoped that parents in rural areas will make an effort to have their children visit their own dentist regularly and keep the teeth in good condition.
