Reason Restored by Surgery.
 Horace Tetlow, of Philadelphia, has
 been restored, by a surgical operation,
 to reason. He uttered the other day
 his first intelligent words since the first
 day of the Conemaugh flood, Friday,
 May 31, 1889, when his skull was
 crushed by a piece of falling timber.
 Since that time he has been an imbecile.
 Last week a thorough examina-
 tion was made of the wound in his
 skull. Trepanning was decided upon.
 The operation was performed on Tues-
 day, a bone button, the size of a half
 dollar being removed. The patient,
 upon opening his eyes, said: "It comes
 from the dam." His mind is a blank
 as to the occurrences of the last six
 years, but he recalls the events of his
 life preceding the accident that ren-
 dered him speechless.
A Watch That Speaks.
 A wonderful mechanical contrivance
 is announced from Switzerland in the
 shape of a watch that calls out the
 hours in a voice like that of a human
 being. This mechanical curiosity is the
 invention of one Casimir Livan, who
 based its principles upon his knowledge
 of the workings of the phonograph.
 The case, instead of containing a strik-
 ing apparatus, as some of the late costly
 watches do, is provided with a phono-
 graphic cylinder, which is fitted with a
 sensitive photographic plate, which has
 received the impression of a human
 voice before being inserted in the watch.

AMONG RATTLESNAKES.

Where a Doctor Slept Without Knowing It.
 "When I was collecting specimens of plants and animals in Zacatecas," said the noted Dr. Maximilien Schumann, "I had an experience with rattlesnakes which came near being the death of me."
 The doctor had just returned from Sacramento, where he had been for a couple of days on a hunting trip.
 "I had gone a day's journey on horseback from the city of Zacatecas to the southwest, to examine some old Toltec ruins there. These are known as the Quemada ruins. They are very extensive. I got there late at night. I had shot a couple of doe on the way and had thrown them across my pack animal."
 "On my arrival within the ruins I lit a fire to get my supper, after which I spread my blankets and lay down. In the morning when I woke up I threw my hand outside of the blanket, and it almost touched a big, poisonous rattle-snake. I escaped by the merest chance. "Looking toward my feet, what was my astonishment to see rattlesnakes all over my blankets. There were no less than six of them, besides the one that had so narrowly missed my hand."
 "The reptiles were not the crotalus horridus or diamond crotalus known in California, but the crotalus mliarius, found in the hot regions. They are very poisonous. When I had lit my fire in the evening I could not see the snakes, which, I presume, had crept along the walls. The altitude of Zacatecas and the old ruins is between 7,000 and 8,000 feet, and it gets quite cold at night."
 "My fire was what undoubtedly attracted them. When they got out toward it they found my bed, and, concerning the warm blankets, crawled up on them and went to sleep. I have always thought it was almost miraculous that I escaped being bitten. As I did not want the snakes, having already all I wanted, I killed them and nailed them all to the adobe wall, with my card on each to be sent to Europe."
 "The lizards and other reptiles which I got there I salted away in casks and forwarded to Europe. It is a general belief among the Indians, notably among the Creeks, Cherokees and Choctaws in Indian Territory, where I was for a time, that if one is bitten by a rattlesnake all he has to do to prevent fatality is to eat the snake. But I never discovered any virtue in this. The best remedy is to immediately bind a plug above the wound, so that the poison cannot circulate higher. Then cut an incision below the wound and squeeze out as much blood as possible. Then, if to the wound is made an application of potash, or any alkali, there is almost no danger."
 "I got the best collection of reptiles from Mexico, and forwarded them to Europe, that has ever been seen there. The rattlesnakes were so plentiful that they could be seen by thousands and thousands."—San Francisco Call.

DAIRY MEETING AT NORTH WILTSHIRE.
 A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Hall at Wiltshire on Saturday, the 28th inst. Mr. Harry Jenkins occupied the chair. Mr. John Moore, of Crapaud, gave a practical address on running creameries and on general farming. Messrs. T. J. Dillon and J. R. Moore of the Dairying Service, gave short addresses on dairy farming. A lively discussion then took place, in which Messrs. Balderson, Campbell, Clark, Henderson, McLod, of Crapaud, and others took part. Mr. Dillon answered all questions in a satisfactory manner. It was moved by Mr. Balderson and carried unanimously that we at once form a company and solicit stock to build a cheese and butter factory at or near Wiltshire station. A committee of seven was appointed to canvass for stock and cows. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the speakers, to which feeling replies were made.

 A TALL QUARTETTE.—The Muncion Transcript says: The train from the east last evening contained four young men from P. E. Island for the United States. The shortest one of the number stood 6 ft. 3 in., while the tallest, a lad of 19 years, measured 6 ft. 6 in. They were without exception the tallest quartette ever seen at the I. C. E. station here and were naturally the cause of considerable curiosity.
 The Volkraad has refused President Kruger permission to go to England and in consequence he has refused Mr. Chamberlain's invitation to visit London and confer with the British authorities regarding Transvaal affairs.

Another colony that appears to be on the point of adding to its debt in order to provide for its defence is New Zealand. The Hon. J. G. Ward, Treasurer and Minister of Marine in the Auckland Government, fore shadowed a departure of this kind in a recent public speech. New Zealand being a group of islands, any system of defence it adopts would naturally be expected to favor sea power. The creation of a navy is the chief of just contemplated in Mr. Ward's outlook. There has been so much war in the air during the last four months that it is little wonder if New Zealand should think it prudent to strengthen herself against foreign attack. Possibly, too, the fact that she is a country of islands may have given rise to dreams of future maritime greatness in the minds of her statesmen. Japan's brilliant example may have helped to give New Zealand a glimpse of like possibilities.

England's naval expenditures and fiscal conditions at present stand out in strong contrast with those of the United States. At first it was expected that her national debt would be reduced by \$65,000,000 this year, but since the increase in naval construction has been adopted the reduction of debt will not be less than \$25,000,000. Uncle Sam, on the other hand, after paying off \$1,800,000,000 of debt in twenty-five years, has made an increase in three years of \$202,000,000. In accordance with the naval programme of each country, many warships are being constructed.
