NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Cunard officials announce that the damage suffered by the Campana in the collision reported yesterday will not prevent her sailing for the United States next Saturday.

—News received from Ottawa says that the Russian Government is going to compensate Canadians as well as Americans whose sealing schooners were seized by that Government in 1892.

—The Legislature of Cape Colony is now in session. Sir Alfred Milner, in the course of the speech from the Throne, said that the war would soon be over and then South Africa will be united and prosperous.

—Some of the Liberals are calling for a convention to lay down a new set of principles. But new men are also needed. It has been truly remarked that the present men would have no more respect for new principles than they have had for the old ones.

—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, according to report, will stay at Ottawa much of the summer, attending to the duties of his office. The Montreal Gazette remarks that this is another sign that the elections are in the air. Ordinarily July and August do not provide so much routine work as to require the Premier's presence at the capital. Arranging for the elections will.

—In the West the Conservatives are putting splendid candidates in the field. In Assiniboia Mr. R. S. Lake, M. L. A., of Grenfell, has just been nominated to oppose Mr. Douglas. Mr. Lake is the son of Col. Lake, a distinguished Indian officer, and a brother of the Colonel Lake who was on the Defence Commission. He is a fine specimen of manhood, a thorough farmer, and a popular man in the constituency.

—It has been remarked that in Canada, while good domestic servants can generally find employment and the mines always attract a good many, what we most need is a constant supply of persons who have a little capital and are not too proud to work, and have good health and strength, to take up land in the Northwest. The sooner newer Canada is filled up, the better it will be for the whole of the Dominion.
—The Legislature of Cape Colony, now in session, is asked to approve a bill providing for a special court with special powers to try the hundreds of rebels who have already been put in goal, and others who have taken a leading part in the rebellion. A commission will be created to deal with the rank and file of the rebels, with power of sentencing for a period of five years and to disfranchisement and deprivation of other civil rights.

—The Montreal Star of Saturday contains a cartoon entitled "Our Boxers" and inscribed as follows: "They have burnt incriminating balloons, broken all their ante election promises, inflicted innumerable scandalous tortures on the public, pillaged the treasury, and are now marching to the polls to endeavor to retain their power in the country—the allied provinces should suppress them." We need not say that the cartoon is made up of portraits of our Liberal ministers at Ottawa, prominent among whom is our own Sir Louis.

—An effort is being made to merge into one party of the Republicans who are distinguished with McKinley and his Imperial policy and the Democrats who dislike Bryan and the silver plank on which he stands. These men find that there is no candidate for whom they can conscientiously vote, and they do not like to be obliged to argue from the negative side only. Therefore it is proposed to put another ticket in the field. It is spoken of as a third ticket, but this is not correct, for there are already seven or eight tickets in the field in addition to those of the two great parties. The proposed platform of the new party condemns militarism, calls for the recognition of the independence of Cuba, the Philippines, Puerto Rico and Hawaii, demands the abolition of special privileges, and favors civil service reform. Free silver is opposed.

—La Patrie speaks with enthusiasm of Mr. Davin's speech on the death of Lieut. Borden. "Mr. Davin," it says, "is beyond question the most pathetic speaker in the

House. The flexibility and sonority of his voice, the variety of the imagery with which his speeches are embellished, his splendid physique, all unite to make him a distinguished orator, whose voice is always welcome in such tragic circumstances as those of this evening. The member from Assiniboia expressed himself in a tone of sincerity and of deep sorrow which communicated itself to all the members of the House in learning of the fatal news." But Mr. Davin shines in debate invariably. He is a master of phrases, and a king at repartee. His description of the Government and its unredempted pledges as "congested pawn shop" is unequalled, and his reply to Mr. McMullen on the subject of rooms to let was certainly both swift and accurate. The North-West has in Mr. Davin a Parliamentary representative of whom it may well be proud.

—Sacerdos, writing in American Herald, condemns our easy tolerance of evil in the following words: It has been remarked that the easy tolerance of moral evil is one of those tendencies which sap the very springs of civilization, which eat out the vigor and core of its life. We do not see its advance; it is in the air. It gilds the danger around us with nothing less than a deceptive beauty. It makes us easy and tolerant when it would be the veriest mercy to condemn; it makes us in private life sensitive about being stiff and old-fashioned, and wanting in sympathy for new and striking ideas about moral matters. It makes delight in moral paradoxes which startle religious persons of the generation which is passing away. It makes them talk of God as if he were all benevolence and in no real sense justice. It blinds men to the moral necessities which drew men down into our vale of tears to die as a propitiation for human sin; it makes men turn away almost with fierce indignation from God's own revelations imply that He is, in virtue of His necessity, His indestructible essence, irreconcilable with self-chosen evil. Thus it penetrates society and public morals, and thus it debases sometimes that Heaven-sent faith which alone can save them.

Italian Expedition.

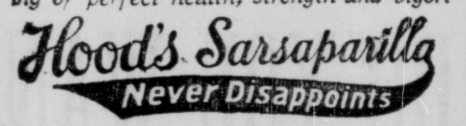
NAPLES, July 21.—King Humbert reviewed the Chinese expeditionary corps before their departure, and afterwards addressed the officers and men. His Majesty said:—

"I bring you my salute and that of my country in wishing good fortune to your arms. You go to a distant region where our flag has been outraged. You go there, not for the purpose of conquest, but only for the defence of the sacred rights of man and violated humanity. In your mission you will have for companions soldiers of the most powerful nations of the world. Be good comrades with them. Try to hold aloft the prestige of the Italian army and the honor of the country. Depart there full of confidence. I accompany you in spirit. May God bless your mission."

The expedition comprises 75 officers, 1,891 men, and a battery of machine guns. They are conveyed by three transports, which will not be escorted until they reach Colombo.

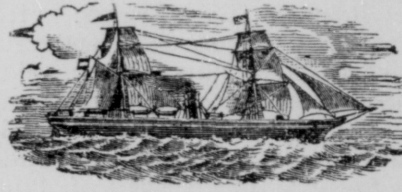
