THE COGHILAN.—Last Thursday by the City of Ghent, Mr. and Mrs. Coghilan and Miss Gertrude Coghilan arrived at Souris and are staying for the present at the Sea View House. Their intention is to remain for the summer at Bay Roberts with their family. Mr. Coghilan, who has purchased Abel's Cape from Mrs. William Conahan, of East Boston, for the sum of fifteen hundred dollars.

SPECIAL ATTENTION is called to the auction sale at the residence of the late Hon. Judge Hensley, Upper Prince Street, on Wednesday, the 27th day of June, inst., commencing at 11 o'clock. Piano, forte, hand-some Japanese screen, also a large quantity of valuable silver and plated ware. The large iron safe, the tower of St. Columba's Church was also struck and damaged so badly that it is thought it will cost near a thousand dollars to repair it. The large iron safe on the top of the steeple most probably drew the lightning, which passing downward shattered everything before it, one of the posts on which the gallery rested being torn in splinters. Some of the posts were also scattered about inside. It is reported that two men on the Cape Breton coast were killed by lightning the same evening, but so far it is not known here whether the report is true or not.

ARRESTED BY NOW FREE.—There was quite a little commotion caused in Souris on Wednesday evening when it became known that a leading young man employed at one of the hotels, had been arrested on suspicion of theft. The constables took him in charge, and as it was late in the evening when the arrest was made, they were compelled to sit up with him all night in the kitchen of the hotel. Morning came at last, however, and with it came two local J. P.'s, to try the case. The evidence produced was insufficient to convict, but the prisoner was held over till evening for further revelations. But it seems he was not happy in the company of the officers of the law, and decided not to be held over any longer. Just before the afternoon train left the station he made a dash for liberty along the railway track, followed by the constable in charge. He struck a 2.40 gait from the start, which soon distanced his pursuer. The last that was seen of him was he was running a westerly course, never once halting to have a glance at the park.
