

# Says Eisenhower's Words Don't Square With Acts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adlai Stevenson added new heat to the presidential race Wednesday, saying President Eisenhower's words don't square with acts of his administration.

Eisenhower had charged the Democrats with "political irresponsibility at its worst" in saying that the Republicans are indifferent to the needs of the people.

In effect, Stevenson's reply was to repeat that the Republicans have been indifferent, despite all Eisenhower says.

Eisenhower will have an opportunity to carry this argument along at a press conference to-day.

He may also be asked about Stevenson's comment Tuesday night that Eisenhower has ex-

panded his campaign because "the Republican managers have decided that while they don't stand a part-time president, they can't stand a part-time candidate."

In a speech at Portland, Ore., the Democratic candidate said he thought Eisenhower "sincerely wants to see our children well educated, to see men at work instead of unemployed, and even to see older people enjoy the benefits of social security, whatever his past views on the latter may have been."

**SINGLE INTERESTS**

But, Stevenson said, what Eisenhower says "reflects little realization of the fact that his administration is made up almost entirely of men who represent a

single set of interest."

"They know what they want—and they get it," Stevenson went on. "And if the president doesn't know yet, for example, that many of his fellow Republicans in Congress are in fact against federal aid to education, then it is past the time to get it."

Returns from the Alaska elections set off some jubilation in Democratic ranks. Returns from nearly half the territory's precincts showed Democrats holding leads for 30 of the 39 offices and legislative seats at stake.

Republican national chairman Leonard Hall said "Alaskan returns 'have no significance in connection with the national elections which responsible polls show we are winning.'"

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## C. N. R. Observing Fire Prevention

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 10 — "Fire prevention week is an effective reminder each year of the necessity of constant vigilance against a constant threat," says A. A. Chisholm, supervisor of fire protection for the Atlantic Region of Canadian National Railways.

"In an organization of the size of C. N. R., and especially where we are concerned with the safety of the public, fire prevention is always a major project, and we make sure that every employee is aware of its importance," Mr. Chisholm said in an interview.

"Actually, every week is fire prevention week with the railway."

This week, heads of departments from Riviere du Loup, Quebec to St. John's, Nfld., are being contacted with reminders of the special emphasis being placed on fire prevention. A thorough check of all buildings and premises owned by Canadian National Railways is being made, and if any hazards are found to exist, steps are being taken to immediately correct them.

Chimneys, heating equipment, and electrical appliances are included in the overall inspection.

Fire fighting equipment, which is maintained by C. N. R. at all installations in the region, and on all trains and steamships, also is being gone over carefully to ensure that it is ready for instant action. Special care is being taken to ensure that such equipment is located where it is easily accessible, and not obstructed in any way.

## Heavy Docket In County Court

Speeding appeared as the biggest single offense on a heavy, 31-case docket considered by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning. Mr. J. P. Nicholson appeared for the Crown.

A total of 18 speeders appeared, 14 of whom received fines of \$10 and costs; three were fined \$12 and costs, and the last \$20 and costs.

A pair charged under the Criminal Code with driving while intoxicated were each fined \$65 and costs while two others charged under the Temperance Act with being intoxicated in a public place received fines of \$20 and costs. For having unlawful liquor in one's possession a person was fined \$20 and costs, as was from a Government vendor on a permit other than his own. Another for having liquor in his possession not purchased from a Government store was fined \$25 and costs.

Under violations of the Highway Act, two unlicensed drivers were fined \$10 and costs, and \$5 and costs respectively.
