There is conflict between military chiefs and W. Averell Harriman's temporary committee on the 1000-division target for 1954. The committee says the target must be reduced by 12 per cent to ease the rearmament burden on Europe's groaning economies.

Wheat And Potato Prices Push Total Up

OTTAWA, Feb. 21 (CP)—The gross value of Canada's 1951 principal field crops was estimated by the Bureau of Statistics today at a record \$1,977,105,000—an increase of more than \$100,000,000 over the preliminary estimate of \$1,876,000,000.

It also was about \$100,000,000 higher than the previous record of \$1,874,500,000 for Canadian farm field-crop production in 1950. The jump over the preliminary estimate, said the bureau, results from recent increases in the initial or preliminary delivery price paid farmers for their wheat deliveries, price advances for some crops such as potatoes, and added payments to sugar-beet producers.

Production figures were virtually unchanged from previously published estimates. The wheat crop was placed at a near-record of 562,395,000 bushels; oats, 492,683,000; barley, 252,795,000; rye, 18,007,000; potatoes, 66,647,000; and hay and clover, 17,316,000 tons.

Probe Continues In Tanker Disasters

BOSTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—Two tugs dragging half a ship and 18 men were ploughed towards port tonight through wind and snow while in Boston an investigating board probed the disaster which ripped apart two steel tankers in Monday's gale and killed 14 men.

Officials said after the three-day meeting that a series of recommendations had been drawn up for the approval of the Federal and Nova Scotia Governments, which are sharing the cost of the project. No details were announced.

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Plows Working Continuously On Clearance Of Highways

Cessation of the snowfall which had been almost continuous since early Monday morning came as a welcome relief to tired snowplowers throughout the Province yesterday. At the same time slightly milder temperatures softened the top snow and aided in stopping the heavy drifting which had been the cause of most of the traffic tie-ups.

Provincial Government plows were encountering a great amount of difficulty all through the day and night as the heavy drifting slowed the work of clearing the highways and in some cases held it almost to a minimum. None of the main highways were reported open at a late hour last night, but the plows were ordered to work through the night in order to make as much progress as possible.

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., Feb. 21 (CP)—Sixteen witnesses gave evidence today at preliminary hearing into a double murder charge against 18-year-old Roy Haggart, charged with the shooting deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Haggart, his uncle and aunt.

The hearing will continue tomorrow. The chairman of the Board of Directors, with Mr. G. H. Howatt as vice-chairman and Mr. J. A. Meeley secretary-treasurer, the meeting was presided over by Mr. McLean, who requested Rev. T. H. B. Somers to open the proceedings with prayer.

Urges Greater Federal Aid For Education

HALIFAX, Feb. 21 (CP)—Russell Cunningham (C.C.F.—Cape Breton East) told the Nova Scotia Legislature today that the Dominion should give more financial aid for education and said Western provinces are receiving income which belongs in part to the original provinces of confederation.

At least five provinces—British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Quebec and New Brunswick—are expected to hold general elections this year. The British Columbia Government has announced that an election definitely will be held. The date likely will be fixed for mid-June. While no announcements have been made, signs point to summer or fall elections in the four other provinces.

Ontario Plans Boost In Home-Building Program

TORONTO, Feb. 21 (CP)—A further attempt to stimulate house-building will be made at this session of the Ontario Legislature which opened today. The announcement was contained in the 1,500-word Speech from the Throne, read by Lieutenant-Governor Louis Briehaupt, which outlined government plans for legislation this year.

No Prisoners Of War Involved Reports Indicate

PUSAN, Korea, Feb. 21 (Friday)—(AP)—One American soldier and 69 Korean civilian internees were killed Monday in a Communist-led riot at a Koje Island stockade, U. S. authorities said today.

The authorities said about 1,500 civilian inmates of the compound attacked U. S. security troops with steel pickets, wooden clubs, barbed wire flails, black jacks, metal tent pole spokes, iron pipes, rocks and knives.

New Gloom At Truce Talks

MUNSAN, Korea, Feb. 22 (Friday)—(AP)—Communist insistence on Russia as a "neutral" inspector tightened the Korean truce talk deadlock Thursday, and an Allied broadcast laid the blame on Moscow.

In the gloomy atmosphere of fresh statements, staff officers agreed to return to the conference tents of Panmunjon at 11 A.M. (P.M. E.S.T. Thursday) to try again.

New Canadian Stamp Series To Be Issued

OTTAWA, Feb. 21 (CP)—The Post Office Department announced today that the first of a series of postage stamps portraying the resources of Canada will be issued April 1. It will be a steel-blue 20-cent stamp symbolizing the wealth of forestry products manufactured from Canada's great timber resources.

Rush Tests On Cattle Disease Outbreak In Regina, Sask. Area

OTTAWA, Feb. 21 (CP)—Laboratory technicians today speeded work at nearby Hull, Que., on orders to complete tests quickly on an infectious animal disease uncovered in the Regina area.

The findings may bring profound relief or despair to Western livestock producers. An announcement on the results may be made this week-end or possibly late tomorrow if tests can be completed by then, agricultural officials said.

Rotation Is In Air Again In Korean War Zone

WITH THE CANADIANS IN KOREA, Feb. 21 (CP)—Rotation is in the air again. The theatre is alive with that counting-the-days atmosphere which characterized life in the 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry late last summer.

Announcement of the army plans for the operation, including earlier return of men eligible for the paratrooper volunteers' course now that they have spent the requisite time in the theatre, has quieted speculation but heightened the anticipation of home-going.

Declines Comment
