UNITED STATES.

Charges of gross corruption against Washington officials continue to be brought forward. The correspondent of the *Courier and Enquirer* says:—The charges appear to affect both the Treasury and War Departments. Mr. Wendell, the public printer, testifies that a public contractor informed him that it cost him ten thousand dollars to 'fix' Mr. Young, architect employed in the Department, in favor of certain alterations in the plan of the Mobile Custom House, by which he, the contractor, made double the sum. Another gentleman, equally reliable, testifies that the same contractor informed him that it cost a very large sum 'to fix' the friend of Secretary Guthrie, but undeterred by such formidable difficulties, the contractor did fix the friend of Secretary Guthrie, to the great advantage of both the active and passive parties in the operation. Mr. Puryear, of North Carolina, stated that the Committee on Public Buildings had applied to the War Department for information on these facts, and that the Secretary had declined to furnish it, unless in answer to a resolution of the House. The financial irreproachability of this administration has been made quite a card in the canvass. It is likely to be trumped by these exposures proceeding from family disputes. A gentleman informs the *Boston Journal* that it is not uncommon to find upon the books of the departments certain items of expenditure for trifling articles, such as pens, paper, &c., detailed with extraordinary minuteness, while on the very next page perhaps would be a debit of a million of dollars in one lump for work on the Washington water works, or some other public work, which rewards the faithful with rich contracts, and, as would appear from the above developments, puts money in the pockets of certain government officials.

KANSAS.—New York, July 16.—The report that G. W. Brown, the editor of the *Herald of Freedom*, had been shot,

is not true. Gov. Robinson and the other prisoners are still encamped on the prairie at Leecompton. Walker, the Captain of the guard, barricaded a small cabin about half a mile from Leecompton, to protect the prisoners from a rescue on the 4th, and treated them so badly, that Col. Sumners sent Walker and his company to the fort, and placed another company, commanded by Sackett, over the prisoners. The prisoners are now treated well, and are allowed to receive their friends.

Advices from Leavenworth, of 11th inst., state that Gen. Persifer Smith had arrived. Next day a deputation of citizens waited upon him, asking protection for their lives and property, against the armed marauders from the south, at the various river towns. Smith replied that he had no authority to grant such protection; that the armed bands alluded to, were regularly enrolled militia, acting under colour of the law, and that the people had no redress excepting from the civil law.

TRIAL OF HERRERT.—Washington, 10th.—The Herbert murder case was formally opened this morning. The testimony for the prosecution was closed at the adjournment of Court, although the counsel for the prisoner unsuccessfully insisted that it was the duty of the government to have present all who witnessed the killing of Keating. The prisoner occupies a seat in the dock, and is occasionally cheered by the conversation of distinguished friends. A dense crowd was present. The jury were unable to agree in their verdict. They are said to have stood ten for acquittal, and two for conviction. On the 15th, another jury was procured for a new trial, chosen from 105 men. The Worcester *Spy* says that a letter has been received in that city from a gentleman in California, which states that Herbert has been notified by the Vigilance Committee of San Francisco, never to show his head in California again, under the severest penalties. He is said to have been a monte dealer in California besides.

THE SUMNER ASSAULT.—It appears by the telegraphic report of the proceedings in Congress on Monday, that the House refused to pass the resolution for the expulsion of Brooks. A majority of the members present voted for the resolution, but the constitution requires that a member shall be expelled only by a vote of two-thirds of the House. Anticipating such a result, Mr. Brooks has resigned his seat, but will probably be re-elected by his constituents. We do not see why it would not be in the power of the House to pass such a resolution whenever he again takes his seat. The presence of an individual who has committed an act so cowardly and disgraceful, should under no circumstances be tolerated without protest.—Boston Journal.

Mr. Sumner, it is thought by the physicians, will not be able to resume his duties before September, though he still hopes by present rest to take his seat during the present session. Mr. Sumner had never before, (says the *New York Times*), been absent from his legislative duties a single day for the five years that he has been a senator.

CANADA.

The *Bas Canada* states that fifteen families of French farmers from Normandy, and fifty-two individuals from Belgium, have arrived, to settle on Government lands, in Lower Canada, and are only the first instalment of a large French emigration expected there during the present season. It is believed that these fifteen families from Normandy are a larger emigration from France to Canada than has taken place in any one year since the conquest of the Province.

GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY.—Spite of all the croaking of the opposition, this great national work is rapidly approaching its completion. Success to it, and may it never stop until it stretches from Lake Huron to old Halifax in Nova Scotia!—Niagara Mail.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.

FREDERICTON, July 17.

The Session was opened with the usual formalities. At 2 1/2 o'clock the House proceeded to elect a Speaker. The Hon. Charles Simmonds was proposed by Mr. Macpherson, and seconded by Messrs. Barberie and Ead, and elected without opposition. The Speaker having been approved of in the usual form His Excellency opened the Session with the following Speech:— Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: I have gladly availed myself of the first opportunity of meeting you after having recurred to the sense of the people. The law which prohibits the importation, manufacture of and traffic in, intoxicating Liquors, forms a subject for earnest deliberation, and I trust that a measure on this subject, which will be submitted to you without delay by the Government, will receive at your hands the consideration which its importance essentially demands. I do not doubt that your decision on this question, which so deeply affects the social and financial interests of the community, will be satisfactory to the people, and it will afford me the most sincere pleasure to find that the exercise of a power entrusted to me by the constitution has been productive of consequences so beneficial to the Province. You may be well assured that I have no wish but to consult the general welfare, and by a uniform adherence to the principles of the constitution, to uphold in their first balance the rights of each branch of the Legislature, and thus to secure the maintenance of liberty and order. I leave you to your deliberations, with the heartfelt prayer, that Providence may bless them for the peace and prosperity of the Province.

Mr. Ead introduced a bill to continue the act to provide for the expenses of the Legislature. There was a long discussion about reporting the proceedings of the House, which ended in the appointment of a committee to make arrangements for publishing the debates of the present session. The committee will report to-morrow. The address in reply to the Governor's Speech was moved by Mr. Boyd and seconded by Mr. Desbrisay, and its consideration stands as the order of the day for Saturday. The House adjourned shortly after 4 o'clock.

THE LIQUOR LAW.—A correspondent of the *Bristol Mercury*, writing from this Province, tells some trifles respecting the working of the Prohibitory Law here, the paper having been handed us by an anti-prohibitionist. The writer says:— "Doubtless you have heard a great deal said at home (England) on the New Brunswick liquor law. It will not be out of place if I give you a little information about it, for I know that what you have heard is neither more nor less than wilful misrepresentation. I am in the habit of receiving from a friend in England the *Alliance*. In the two last I received I find three letters—two from a magistrate of St. John, and one from a member of the legislative assembly. Those letters I must tell you, are unfairly written, and are not truthful. What do you think of a magistrate writing to England saying that drunkenness is not to be seen—that the law works well—and that no spirits are brought into the Province, when such is just the opposite of what is the case? For proof. In the *New Brunswick* I read (April 5) of persons brought before the magistrate of St. John for drunkenness—and this is quite a common occurrence. I can prove that in this village (Fredericton) liquors are sold every day, not privately, but openly. I had occasion to call upon a publican; while talking, a man came in and asked for a dram. The decanters were brought down, he helped himself (as is the custom) to what he wanted, paid his York shilling, and left. Upon my expressing surprise, I was assured by the good lady of the house that every other sold now that sold before the law came into force—or rather before it was enacted. A few weeks ago twelve or thirteen publicans were brought before the magistrates of Fredericton, when every one was dismissed. These facts are well known to Messrs. Tilley and Demill, who wrote to England such glowing accounts of this law. The fact is, the law is impopu-

lar. It is said that more liquor has been drunk in the province since the 1st of January than ever was drunk during a like period before that date. It is a fine time for the liquor sellers; they sell more liquors than ever, get a higher price for them, and the best of it all for them is, that they have no licence to pay! Here, then, is a direct loss to the revenue of £40,000 annually, and the country in no better condition than it was before the law was passed. With respect to the importation of spirits, they are frequently brought into the province along with a drink from Maine, which is called 'White-eye.' Just as it occurs to my mind, I'll mention that I saw a statement, made by one of the Senators of Maine, to the effect, that 'since the law had passed, crime and drunkenness had increased 10 per cent.'—St. John Courier.

LOCAL NEWS.

EXAMINATION AT ST. DUNSTON'S COLLEGE, PRINCETOWN ROAD.—*Haszard's Gazette* furnishes the following short notice of the first examination of the pupils in the above institution. His Lordship the Catholic Bishop of Charlottetown, the Honble. Provincial Secretary, the Solicitor General, the Revs. Messrs. Phelan, Perry and Brady, John Morris and John Gainsford, Esquires, and a variety of others—parents of the children and well-wishers of the institution—were present. For our self we have only to say, that we were highly gratified. We see in the progress of this, and other educational establishments, the best promise of the future happiness and prosperity of this Island."

In the mean time, he can most confidently and conscientiously introduce his son as having had a most complete classical and professional education, and many years professional training under the best physicians, surgeons, chemists and pharmacians that the general practice of England produces, prepared him for the liberal advantages of the "States" Colleges, of which he has availed himself with more than ordinary industry, perseverance and success, having obtained an applauded Diploma from each College.
