Fox and mink breeders from various parts of the province were present. President B. B. Jones, Dunbury, submitted his annual report which gave a good resume of the fox and mink industry. It appears below.

W. R. Shaw, secretary-treasurer, submitted the financial statement which showed a balance of \$1,420 of unexpended resources.

The annual fox and mink show of 1952 was a splendid success with a large number of both foxes and mink shown, both of excellent

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Bases New March On "Island Hymn" Theme



William Keith Rogers, one of ten Canadian composers commissioned to write an original work in celebration of Queen Elizabeth's coronation. His composition, Coronation March will be included in a program to be broadcast over the Trans-Canada Network of the CBC tonight from Montreal through CBA, Sackville, under the direction of Roland Leduc. The time will be between eight and nine o'clock Atlantic Standard Time.

In this Ceremonial March the composer has tried to express musically the pomp and pageantry of the great city of London during the Coronation celebration. The March opens with an introductory passage leading to the main theme, which is taken chiefly by the brass instruments of the orchestra. This is followed by a section in which the stringed instruments take up a theme which is based on "The Island Hymn," the words by Lucy Maud Montgomery and the music by Lawrence W. Watson.

The composer thought that it was fitting to include this tribute from the birthplace of Confederation to that other Island across the sea from whence sprang many of the pioneers whose names are written into our Island story.

After a recall of the opening measures, the march theme returns and the composition is brought to a triumphal close.

Auxiliary Squadrons To Get CF-100 Jets, Slemon Announces

OTTAWA, (AP)—Air Marshal C. Roy Slemon, chief of air staff, said Tuesday all the RCAF's 12 auxiliary squadrons eventually will be equipped with CF-100 all-weather jet interceptors.

Addressing the fourth annual RCAF Association convention, the air chief disclosed that the RCAF will have both permanent and military squadrons stationed across Canada, equipped with twin-jet supersonic aircraft. When this target is reached the air force will have under command 11 permanent CF-100 squadrons and 12 auxiliary groups, providing a combined fighter-interceptor strength of approximately 550 aircraft. He did not indicate when this objective would be reached.

Air Marshal Slemon said he hoped the objective of 50,000 RCAF personnel would be reached next year.
