In France, as you have been in mind the injunction imposed on me by our most gracious Sovereign, in an important communication by His Excellency the Earl of Derby, now Her Majesty's Private Secretary, namely, "You are to exert every power in your hands, to secure the education of the people, and to have full liberty of conscience, and free exercise of their respective modes of religion, and to give effect to the same, by a quiet and peaceable enjoyment of the same, not giving offence or scandal to the Government."

Care will be required in carrying out the details of the measure; and experience, I trust, will enable the Government to render it efficient, and to allay the apprehensions of the unfortunates increased expense attendant on an improved and extended system must necessarily give rise to.

I am glad to observe that a Bill relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned, has passed the Legislature.
