## Young Kinkora Lawyer Admitted To P.E.I. Bar

Bernard St. Clair McCabe, Kinkora, was admitted to the bar of Prince Edward Island in a ceremony in Supreme Court Charlottetown Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Justice R.T. Bell presided.

The petition of Mr. McCabe for admission as a barrister was read by Attorney General M.A. Farmer, Q.C. with whom the new barrister had been articulated for the past several months.

The young lawyer was admitted to the Bar of Nova Scotia earlier this month and had been articulated in that province with the firm of Fitzgerald and McCleave, Halifax. He received his early education at Kinkora, later entering St. Dunstan's University from where he graduated in 1961. While at SDU he was prominent in many activities and is the life president of the class of '61. Following his graduation from the local university he entered Dalhousie Law School, Halifax, graduating from that institution in the spring of 1964. He took a most active part in college activities while at Halifax and was president for two years of Dalhousie Tech Newman Club.

Mr. McCabe is married. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. McCabe, Kinkora. His father is a potato dealer in that area.

The young barrister was secured office space in Summerside, and will begin practice in that western town in a short time.

His parents were present for yesterday's ceremonies as were several relatives and immediate friends.

## Famous London Restaurant Undergoing Metamorphosis

LONDON (CP)—As the lights went up on Piccadilly Circus this week, one famous rendezvous nearby was dark and deserted, its heavy mahogany and glass doors locked on 69 years of memories.

The Trocadero Restaurant, which yielded Saturday to failing business and the thrusting enterprise of a huge dance-hall chain, has begun a metamorphosis from elegant Edwardian eating place to slick modern pleasure drome.

The giant Mecca Organization, which among many other activities sponsors the annual Miss World contest in London, is laying out about £250,000 to turn the old Troc, as thousands all over the world affectionately knew it, into the biggest entertainment centre in the West End, including a discotheque, cafe for the twist set, a mass-appeal casino and a 10-pin bowling alley.

Builders and decorators have been busy for weeks turning the Trocadero's "sailed almond" restaurant, with its lofty marble walls and panelling, into an imitation grotto with colored plaster stalactites, housing a bar and dance floor where pretty girls will introduce jazz records and pop singers in TV personality style.

It is scheduled to open under its new name, Tiffany's, at the end of March.

## James M. Hughes Dies In City Hosp.

The death took place in the Charlottetown Hospital after a short illness of James M. (Buster) Hughes in his 71st year.

Mr. Hughes retired last year after 44 years service with the Maritime Electric Company. Shortly after his retirement he made a trip as a member of the Royal Canadian Legion pilgrimage to the Netherlands, to visit the grave of his son Maurice who was killed in the latter stages of the Second World War, and who is buried at Holland, Holland. Upon his return from Europe Mr. Hughes was enjoying his leisure until his illness the first of this year.

Mr. Hughes is survived by sons Richard, Frank, and Reginald, residing in Charlottetown, as well as daughters Doris and Mary of Toronto, and Ruth at home. Mr. Hughes wife Lenora predeceased him in November 1957. Mr. Hughes was the grandfather of 29 children as well as the great-grandfather of eight children.

Other survivors are brothers, Frank, Bill, Fred of this city and Ernie of Everett, Mass., and sisters Mary of Everett, Mass., and Blanche of Charlottetown.

His remains will rest at the Hennessy Funeral Home until Friday morning when they will be transferred to St. Dunstan's Basilica for Requiem High Mass after which interment will take place in the Catholic cemetery.

## Plaintiff Negligent Court Rules In Suit

The driver of a car driving straight through the intersection of Grafton and Queen street and which collided with a car making a left turn north onto Queen street has been held responsible in damages of \$600 to the owner of the other car.

The judge on was handed down in the Supreme Court here yesterday by Mr. Justice R.R. Bell.

A car driven by Mrs. Eleanor M. Houston going east on Grafton street stopped for the light at Queen, and when the light changed to green proceeded to make the left turn with its turn indicator blinking. At the same time, another car facing it made a left turn on Queen. The third car, driven by Daniel Keough, came west on Grafton, pulled to the right-hand lane to get around the rear of the car turning down on Queen, collided with the Houston car as it was turning.

Mr. Keough took civil action against Mrs. Houston for damages to his car of \$1,139.50, while Mrs. Houston entered a counter suit for \$1,070 damages to her car. During the trial it was agreed the plaintiff's damages were actually \$1,039.50 and the defendant's \$600. The court ruled "I am unable to find any negligence on the part of the defendant. The plaintiff was negligent in driving at an excessive speed and being in the wrong lane."

Claim of the plaintiff was dismissed with costs with judgment on the defendant's counterclaim for \$600 and costs. G.R. Foster, Q.C., appeared for the defendant and A.K. Seales for the plaintiff.

## Spud Price Structure Studied For Better Returns To Grower

## N.S. Losing Out By Misuse Marked Gas

G.I. Smith, minister of finance and economics for Nova Scotia, recently stated that his province may have lost as much as \$1,100,000 through fuel tax evasions.

A special tax-free gas, marked with a dye is available to farmers and fishermen for vehicles which don't use the public highways. This same system is used here.

Premier W. R. Shaw said, "our system is under strict control of the treasury department and department inspectors watch the situation closely." He also pointed out that the RCMP make highway checks for the marked gasoline.

According to a report by the Nova Scotia government auditors the system allows "vendors and consumers" to fraudulently obtain and sell the tax-free gasoline.

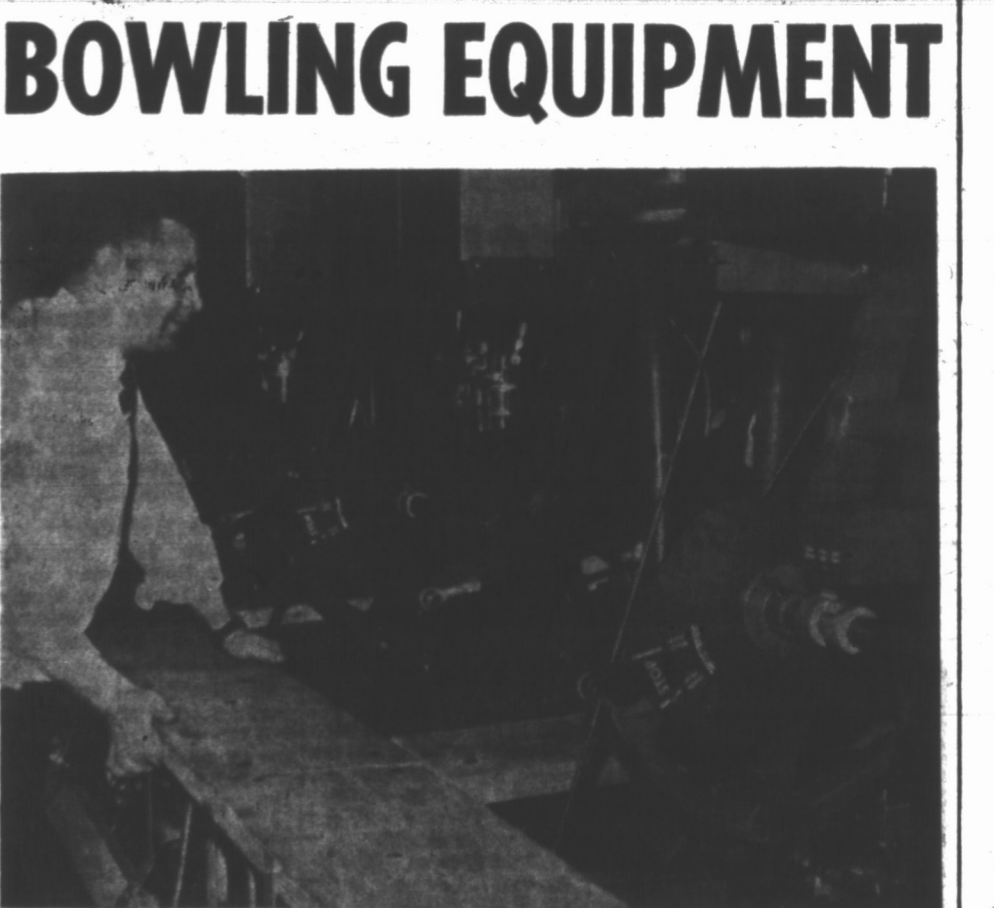
