### IN MEMORIAM

#### MR. ANGUS MACEachERN

The death occurred at his home in Rocky Point on March 15th, of Mr. Angus MacEachern in his 69th year. Although not enjoying good health for some time, his condition was not considered serious, and he was able to enjoy the amenities of life, as well as the companionship of his family and friends; however God in His Divine Wisdom felt his tasks on earth were finished, and he was called suddenly and unexpectedly in the early hours of the above mentioned date.

Mr. MacEachern was born in New Argyle, the eldest son of the late Duncan and Catherine MacEachern. After leaving school, and while quite young, he went to Western Canada and spent a number of years in the construction of bridges in British Columbia and Alaska; however due to illness in the family he returned to his native Province in 1911, and being a "son of the soil", he felt the call and allurements of the Agricultural life, and purchased from his brother John D. the farm at Rocky Point where he has since resided. His interest and Agricultural training was now used to good advantage and he built a home and left behind a tradition of which his family and friends may be justly proud.

He was married in 1916 to Hazel MacNeill of Long Creek who survives him. From this union was born a family of three boys and three girls, viz: Anna and Ella, Halifax, N. S.; Lorne, Clyde River; George, Dawson Club, B. C. (who came home for his father's funeral); Lois and Angus A. Jr., at home. He is also survived by two sisters and four brothers viz: Florrie Argyle; Maimie (Mrs. Bruce MacLean), Long Creek; John D., Dawson Club, B. C.; Stanley, Calgary; Herbert, Edmonton and Colin, New Argyle. Two brothers Donald and Hector, also one sister Stella predeceased him.

A devoted husband and father, his thoughts and work at all times was for the best interests of the home, the church and the community. He was a kind and thoughtful neighbour and friend, always willing to lend a helping hand. He was a reader of more than ordinary intelligence, possessed a retentive memory and so was an interesting conversationalist. Born of the early Scottish pioneers, he was able to relate many interesting anecdotes and folk lore of the early settlers, their ways and methods of livelihood. He was a staunch supporter of the Liberal party and a loyal member of the Presbyterian Church.

The funeral service which was largely attended was held at the home on March 16th, the Rev. Mr. Webster officiating. The hymns sung were "To the Hills Will Lift Mine Eyes" and "The Lord's My Shepherd" favourites of the deceased. The burial took place in the family plot at the New Dominion United Church Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. L. C. MacIsaac, Daniel Smith, Aile MacIsaac, Jas. Smith, Herbert Georveatt and Allison MacMillan. 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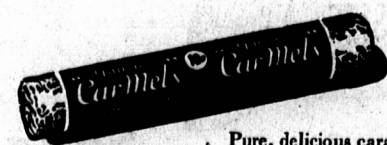
