

Report Reveals Atrocious Programme Of Red Torture

LONDON, (Reuters)—A British government report said today a cold-blooded Communist programme of physical torture and psychological pressure had almost one-third of the British soldiers captured in Korea act as Communist sympathizers during their captivity.

It said that out of 978 Britons held by the Communists only 600 officers and senior non-commissioned officers remained "almost unimpaired" by Communist propaganda persuasion—backed by beatings, solitary confinement and a mind-shattering collection of other physical and mental tortures.

About one-third of the junior non-coms and other men—30 per cent of the total captives—broke down and "absorbed sufficient indoctrination to be classed as Communist sympathizers," the report said. But some of the men merely feigned Communist sympathies and most probably have been rehabilitated since their return home.

Even prisoners who just pretended to accept communism ran a risk of unconsciously being influenced by the Communist opinions they were forced to parrot, the report said.

It concluded, however, that only 40 prisoners were dedicated and convinced Communists when released. Some have been Communist convictions or sympathies before capture.

All but one of the British prisoners elected to return home after the Korea armistice.

The report said the Communist success, striking at first glance, was "comparatively small" considering the unpreparedness of British soldiers for attempts to convert them and the intensity of the Communist torture and persuasion tactics.

Prisoners who resisted indoctrination were treated with savage brutality in an attempt to break them down.

At one camp "reactionary" prisoners were confined inside cramped boxes five feet by three feet
