RIEL'S TRIAL.

WITNESSES EXAMINED.

SOME OF THE EVIDENCE.

The Insanity Plea to be Used for All It is Worth!

REGINA, July 30.

The following witnesses have been examined in Riel's trial: Dr. Willoughby, of Saskatoon; Thomas McKay, Half-breed; John Ashley, Surveyor, Prince Albert; H. Ross, Peter Tompkins and Wm. Tompkins, Indian Agents; Jack and Geo. Neas.

Willoughby deposed to a conversation he had with Riel, during which Riel said it was time the Half-breeds should assert their right, and it would be well for those who had led good lives. His people intend striking a blow for their liberty.

McKay deposed to seeing armed men in March last at Batouche, guarding the river, and on speaking to Riel about it, the latter became very excited and said: "You don't know what we are. 'Tis a war of extermination. We want blood! blood! blood! nothing but blood will do us."

It is evident the defence intend relying to a great extent on the insanity plea.

London's Latest Aristocratic Scandal.

LONDON, July 30.

Proceedings are pending against Sir Charles Dilke involving damages of £20,000 in connection with the now famous scandal case. Strong local and political influences, are working to avoid a public trial. Sir Charles Dilke is completely prostrated, and he has retired to the country. The lady concerned is related to Mrs. Ashton Dilke, and the injured husband is an active radical and formerly held a minor office. It is reported he insists upon a divorce to vindicate his honor, damages being no object to him. His wife received a dowry of £100,000 from her father who is a member of Commons. The lady is much younger than her husband and they have no family.

Irish Industries.

LONDON, July 30.

The committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the condition of the Irish industries have presented an informal report to Parliament. In this it is stated all Irish industries, with the exception of the linen manufacturers, are at present in a deplorable condition. The report recommends the improving of the railway facilities of Ireland, by the introduction of a process of teaching of the sciences relating to industrial work in all the national schools, and a comprehensive system of arterial drainage.

The Tyrannical Rule of Russia.

SIMLA, July 30.

At a recent meeting at Darbar, the Ameer of Afghanistan spoke of the relations between here and England, and said he was convinced that England desired nothing but good to the Afghans. The Ameer advised his people to cultivate friendship to England and said it would be a bad day for them if they ever came under the tyrannical rule of Russia.

The Egyptian Loan.

CAIRO, July 30.

The Khedive has issued a decree explaining the charges to be paid for the new Egyptian Loan of \$45,000,000. He says claims for indemnity arising out of the bombardment and pillage of Alexandria, and losses resulting from British occupation will constitute a first charge on the loan. \$50,000,000 of the loan is intended, the decree says, to be expended in irrigation works for the benefit of the fellahs engaged in agricultural pursuits.

The Northwest Mounted Police.

OTTAWA, July 29.

H. C. H. Primrose and S. T. Wood, graduates of the Royal Military College, Kingston, have been appointed Inspectors in the Northwest Mounted Police service. Wood is a son of Captain John Taylor Wood, of Halifax, and Primrose is also of Halifax.

Obnoxious Excise Laws.

MADRID, July 30.

Huesca, the capital of the Provinces of Huesca, has risen in revolt against the execution of the excise laws. Yesterday, rioting was serious. The enraged people attacked the office of the Excise Collector and burned it.

Russian Force on the Afghan Frontier.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 29.

St. Vato, the Russian military organ, says the present strength of the Russian forces on the Afghan frontier consists of 20,000 men, stationed between Pendjoh and Zulficar.

Munster Bank Frauds.

DUBLIN, July 30.

Extensive frauds have been discovered in the accounts of the Munster Bank. Farquharson, one of the managers of the Dublin Bank, is missing with \$359,000.

Cholera on the French Frontier.

MADRID, July 30.

Cholera has broken out on the French frontier. One fourth of the inhabitants of Montequado have died of cholera during the past ten days.

At the close of his lecturing tour in the United States in 1872-73, Prof. Tyndall devoted the proceeds, amounting to over \$13,000, to the encouragement of studies in physical science.
