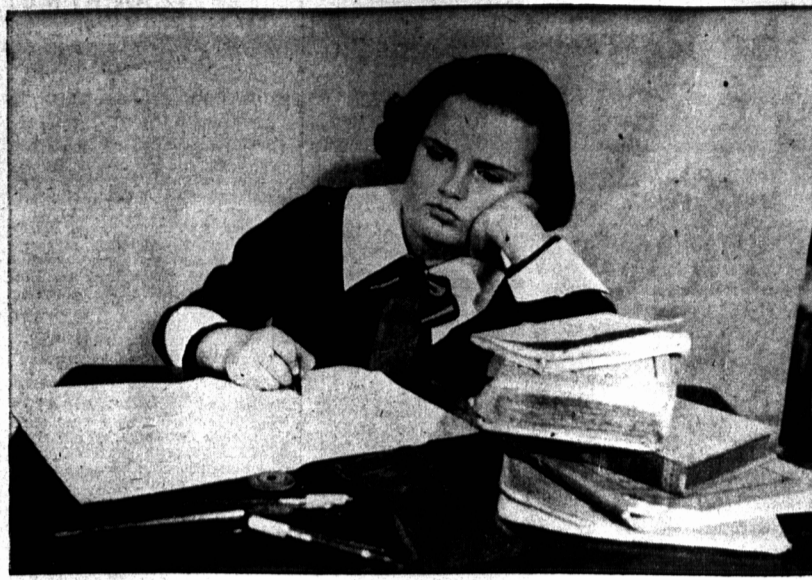

For one to complain that they the standards of other reputable are too strict, too high-minded, or too "long hair", is to attest his own weakness, slothfulness, lack of the knowledge of the essentials of grammar and spelling, or some such deficiency. This last mentioned deficiency might well be the crux of the problem. If a man cannot write his graduation thesis and finds that he has not at his command the necessary grammatical tools, it would be quite easy to understand why he hasn't been able to contribute worthy articles for publication in the Red and White, and also perhaps why he has spoken out against the publication on some occasion or other. Men often attack something that they don't understand simply because fear is often born of a lack of knowledge and understanding. But that a man should find himself in such a dire state on the eve of his graduation is unthinkable; a man who can't express himself has no business with a degree. That an Arts graduate should go forth so ill-prepared is even more unthinkable. It should be, then, that any and every Arts student should be capable of producing worthy and printable material for the Red and White.

If the student, especially the Arts student, finds that he is unable to meet the requirements laid down by the Red and White, then and until it is corrected, wrong; and being pointed out in this regard, by competent individuals, that the first blow that should be struck in this attempt to forge anew the breastwork of the Red and White should be aimed at the English program. There should be made certain provision for the correction of deficiencies and opportunity should be available for more intensive research and application of the rules of style of the recognized masters of the language. To every Arts student immediately would be a study of the works of various social movements, the writing of self-made philosophers, or the works based on past ideologies, when in fact his faculties clamor for basic English and the fundamentals of style, is to miss the point of an introductory English course altogether, we feel. Perhaps in the rectifying of this situation, it will be necessary at first to lead the student with a scholastically coercive hand to the Editor's door by integrating topics suitable for publication with the regular matter of a composition course. However, we feel that with class chosen for this inauguration progresses along the path of achievement and grows in the facile ease of the introductory work, will come a day when they will no longer have to be lead; a day when, with confidence again restored to the venerable campus publication, they will feel proud to support it; a day when the noblest of the traditions of the Red and White will be resurrected and sustained by a more interested and culturally improved student body.

THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

TEMPTATIONS OF CHRIST POINT PITFALLS TO MAN

Most of us realize the need we have for penance and mortification. Unless we discipline ourselves at times by giving up some of our legitimate pleasures, we shall not have the moral strength to make the right choice in time of temptation. We also realize that we must be prudent in the amount and the kind of mortification we undertake. However, even though we appreciate our need for penance and have been prudent in what we have undertaken, still we are under way there are still three pitfalls to be avoided.

After Our Lord fasted for 40 days in the desert, He was near exhaustion and the devil tempted him with three kinds of temptation. He tempted and tried Christ to find out whether He was the Son of God; so too we are tempted when we try to be children of God by following the example of Christ.

After we have done a little penance, the first temptation that comes to us is a certain form of despair. What we have given up may not be very much, but the discomfort which results, suggests to us that the service of God is all pain and privation.

CONVINCING ILLUSION

This is an illusion, but a rather convincing one at the moment. We are tempted to despair of spiritual goods and joys, and this despair gives an exaggerated importance to the things that we have given up.

We tend to clutch at the poor, sensible pleasures which are within our grasp, because our hope in anything better has been weakened. We are tempted to sell out our higher interests for the sake of these others. Thus, for example, when we tell a lie to gain some momentary satisfaction we betray our birthright, which is to know and to speak the truth. In this way Christ was tempted to satisfy His hunger by using His power of working miracles, the primary purpose of which was to strengthen the faith of His disciples.

The answer of Christ should be ours also. "Not in bread alone does man live but in every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." If we are to overcome this temptation, we must ask God to renew our trust in Him as our Father and ask Him to increase our hope in the coming of His Kingdom.

SHUN PRESUMPTION

If we have given in to some e-

are tempted to justify ourselves in terms of the mercy of God. This is presumption and it is the second temptation. The answer of Our Lord is "Thou shalt not tempt the Lord Thy God."

In order to overcome this presumption, we must ask God to show us where His Will differs from our faculties and ask Him for the strength to live according to that Will and to seek pardon when we have sinned against it.

If we are successful in our program of penance and self-discipline, there remains the temptation of the successful, the temptation of pride. When by the grace of God we have become or achieved something worthwhile there is the temptation to worship the good thing which God has made, rather than God Himself.

Again, desires and energies that should be directed to God can be diverted to the service of some idol; and in this way great success can be attained in this world. Christ was promised the kingship of the whole world if he would pay homage to the devil. The answer of Christ was, "The Lord Thy God shalt thou adore and Him only shalt thou serve."

PRAY CONTINUALLY

If we are to keep this commandment and overcome the basic temptation of pride and idolatry, we must pray to God continually that He free us from the attractions of the good things which He has made. We need strength to be able to renounce every created good and pleasure, because every one of them can attract us in circumstances that are against the will of God.

Our attraction to these things is the strength of our temptations; and a man is not truly free who is continually and forcefully drawn toward evil, that disorder which prefers the good things of God, made to God Himself. If we are to enjoy the liberty of the sons of God, we must persevere in penance and pray to God continually that He bless our efforts by lifting us out of temptation and by delivering us from evil.
