Later, she escaped to Germany, where she rejoined her father; and here she was able to resume her studies while she lived in an I. R. O. camp, and found a position as a secretary in the Welfare Division, Area VII HQS, U.S. Zone, Munich, Freimann.

N. B. Forest Fires Continue Serious

FREDERICTON, Oct. 10 (CP)—A change of wind followed evacuation of two more Gloucester County villages today and removal of immediate danger from communities in the forest fire area of Northern New Brunswick. Evacuation of Ottawa and Daigle raised to six the number of communities temporarily abandoned by more than 300 residents. Deserted yesterday were Tetagouche, Luger, North Tetagouche and St. Louis. About 200 inhabitants have re-occupied St. Roseville, St. Charles and South and Lincolnton, deserted last week. Only two dwellings have been burned. Two major fires still raged out of control while crews apparently had six minor outbreaks well in hand. The largest blaze, in the Robertville area, was estimated tonight to have covered 35 square miles. The Tetagouche fire has swept about eight square miles. In both districts the flames licked through good growth of soft and hard timber—spruce, fir, beach, maple and birch. A report that the two fires had joined proved incorrect tonight. A forestry service pilot reported to Chief Forester G. I. Miller that they were about two miles apart.

New Heart Operation Is Reported

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 10 (AP)—A new operation which adds one more piece of knowledge to man's knack of mending damaged hearts was disclosed today by surgeons at Hahnemann Hospital. The heart in this case belongs to 22-year-old Lorene Beam, daughter of a Hazleton, Pa., anthracite miner, and it had been damaged nine years ago by rheumatic fever. For two years after she was ill with the fever Lorene was bedfast. Then she got better, but three years ago was forced back to bed. Last May she came to Hahnemann Hospital. Surgeons, who declined use of their names, said she had mitral regurgitation. The mitral valve, on the left side of the heart, was damaged and failed to close properly. Blood flowing through the valve normally goes into the heart's left ventricle or pump and is sent back into the body through the aorta. But Lorene's mitral valve remained open, allowing the blood to leak back into the left auricle and into the lungs. Two weeks ago the three surgeons cut from Lorene's own heart a piece of tissue (pericardium, the membranous sac which contains the heart). The tissue, about the size of a man's palm, was rolled up like a cigar and threaded on a wire probe. Then the probe was placed through the wall of the heart and out the other side, leaving in the left ventricle a flap of tissue beneath the mitral valve. That tissue, working like a check valve, prevents the blood from

attacks along a 30-mile front 10 to 40 miles east of the 1st cavalry sector.
Capture of Wonsan gave the U.S. forces a prize of immediate strategic importance. Wonsan's air base is 136 miles south of the Russian port of Vladivostok.
Pyongyang, the North Korean capital 95 air miles west of Wonsan, is only 20 minutes flight away from Wonsan.
Wonsan harbor facilities were at least 50-per-cent intact even after heavy bombing attacks by B-29 Superfortresses destroyed the city's industrial and oil refining centres. The deep water port gave the United Nations fleet a base of unlimited anchorage.
AF correspondent William Jordan said the South Korean 3rd Division said the South Koreans were surprised that resistance was not more intense inside Wonsan, although it took grim street-by-street fighting to win the rubbled one-time manufacturing and communications centre.
"The South Korean army would still be miles from Wonsan if the Reds had the determination to resist," Jordan said.
Communist forces held on to high ground west and southwest of the city itself. From these positions the Reds rained small arms and machine-gun fire, and with sporadic mortar and artillery shelling on troops inside the city.
Allied air power supported ground troops in slowly wiping out these hill pockets and in pushing north and west of the city after the main body of retreating Communists.
It was a different story on the western end of the battlefield. There American troops 120 air miles south of Pyongyang battled a stubborn and determined enemy believed to be stacked 25 miles deep.
