Russians Not To Play In Canada

Dutchmen Return Home To Heroes' Welcome Friday

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — Canada's third-place Olympic hockey team returned home to a heroes' welcome Friday and while fans cheered, players and officials praised the play of the all-conquering Russians at the winter Olympics.
But Canadian fans, who want to see the team that defeated the Soviet champions 2-0 in the final game of the Olympics, won't get a chance this year, at least. The Russians left Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy, scene of the Games, last Thursday to play in their own national tournament.
"There is no chance of Russia's Olympic hockey team coming to Canada this year," was the word from Jimmy Dunn of Winnipeg, Canadian Amateur Hockey Association president, as the team made a brief stopover in Toronto earlier in the day. Dunn felt out the Russians on the prospects of a visit while he was at the Games.
"I asked the head of the Russian hockey delegation if he would consider adding the Soviet team to Canada this year and I was told: 'We asked you first to come to our country.'"
"That was it. They won't be over this year," Dunn added.

The Summerside Aces defeated the B.Y.C. of Charlottetown 8-6 in an exhibition benefit game of hockey at Civic Stadium last night after 1,000 fans attending. Canadian And American Leagues To Hold Meeting

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The National Football League and the Canadian football pros will meet Feb. 15 in a novel open session to try and thrash out mutual problems.
Commissioner Bert Bell of the NFL, announced Friday that he would meet in a downtown hotel with Ralph Cooper, representative of the executive committee of the nine clubs in Canada.
Both leagues have charged each other with enticing players to break options and contracts with the other. There have been numerous court fights in both countries with several declarations of open player "war."
Actually, all the battle has accomplished is to force player salaries up. Graduating college seniors and let leagues bid for their services and grab the highest offer.
Apparently the Canadians have made inroads on the veteran American pro league, for this year, for the first time, the NFL held a special draft session, two months before their regular scheduled meeting. 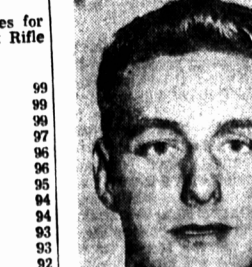

The official hours of the viewing were set at 7 to 10 p.m., but men and women—even children—were drawn to the austere funeral parlor on Philadelphia's Chestnut street long before the set hours.
By nightfall, the marble-pillared funeral home was coping with the same sort of traffic problem that develops outside the baseball stadium where Connie Mack spent so much of his life.

A few days ago we received a copy of the Royal Gazette dated Hamilton, Bermuda. January 27. It is a 12-page paper with plenty of news and a generous amount of advertising. HUNTERS CORNER

The car headlights probed the pre-dawn darkness of December 2nd, pin pointed back farm gates and revealed bare stretches of farmland interspersed with snowy ridges as the driver plotted a safe path into the back of beyond. The sweep of the car lights, as it swung to avoid snow filled hollows, disclosed sentinel trees standing alone in the winter night and the dark mountain of woodland, black and mysterious in the darkest hour before dawn.
The driver stopped at a hedge interspersed by a barbed wire fence and a black sedan pulled up along side. Across this fence and beyond a stretch of meadowland lay the goose fields—a ribbon of stubble 60 yards wide and backed, on one side, by a deep fence row of heavy spruce. There were other areas in the hunting party, this columnist, my hunting partner, an assistant bank manager and an Orwell farmer. Since mid-November the geese had stuck pretty close to the tidal flats but on the last two days of the month they had masses of floating slush. Lully in the waterfowlers hook, had covered the feeding beds of eel and goose grass.

TO THE FIELDS

At 8:00 a.m. on the previous morning, motivated by the pangs of hunger, the flock leaders led their charges inland to the stubble fields. By a lucky coincidence the scouts were out at daybreak that morning and were about ready to call the watch off, when without advance warning, the goose flock was opened 5 o'clock right on the nose. At one moment the clear December air was devoid of life the next long lines of big black and white bombers were swirling.
Three landing grounds were notified but the field decided upon after a council of war, was selected. There was hard to reach the beaten track in the bargain, also it offered the best bet for non-interference by other hunters. Forty odd geese fed in this field until the early winter night laid a ground cover of the feed-down that obscured the feed-down that all but the chances of a shot were as promising as one may ever hope for in goose hunting...its an unpredictable game.
It was a frosty morning but lugging decoys, guns, etc. through fences and across fields kept one busy from morning till night. We constructed our blind in a thicket of young trees at the base of the heavy growth. It afforded excellent cover and allowed a clear field of fire. Geese as a rule sweep clear from the outside of the thicket of tree growth but we gambled on the stubble being only 60 yards wide and even if they swung well to the outside of the 'rig' they'd be in range. We were all set long before the first streak of dawn lightened the east with nothing to do but wait and hope.

A LAST TRY

I wanted this hunt to be a success. For one reason I figured this would be my last try and an old friend of mine had requested that I try and get him a goose. To quote his words "I haven't eaten a wild-goose for 25 years and have almost forgotten what one tastes and Rick Thursday night in the Crapaud-Victoria Board of Trade League.
