Warning Of 'Drastic Action' Is Sounded To Woodworkers

VANCOUVER (CP) — The 30,000-member International Woodworkers of America (IWA), battling against time, warned of possible drastic action if its contract dispute with management is not handled speedily.

While the word strike was not mentioned, a statement by district president Joe Morris following a day-long closed special meeting said:

"The union has decided to maintain its right to act as promptly and as drastically as may be necessary to protect the interests of members against the delays in conciliation procedure." The special meeting was called to consider the executive's recommendation that the union's policy of no contract-no work be lifted.

POLICY NOT MENTIONED

The policy, formulated at the IWA's annual convention earlier this year, was not mentioned in Mr. Morris' statement which summarized resolutions passed at the special meeting of the district

conference attended by representatives from throughout the province.

The union is demanding a 20-per-cent increase over a basic rate of \$1.72 an hour. Forest Industrial Relations, representing employers, has offered 12 cents over a two-year period.

The union wants a speedy report from the conciliation board because its present contract with employers expires June 16. It is not anticipated that the board, which has yet to meet, can bring down a report by that date and the union cannot take a supervised strike vote until then. If it called a strike before then it would be subject to heavy penalties.

But the union fears the possibility of not being able to conduct a vote before the woods are closed for the fire season in July, a month when most mills close down for annual vacation.

If the men come out of the mills and woods before the strike vote the union will have lost a valuable negotiation weapon.

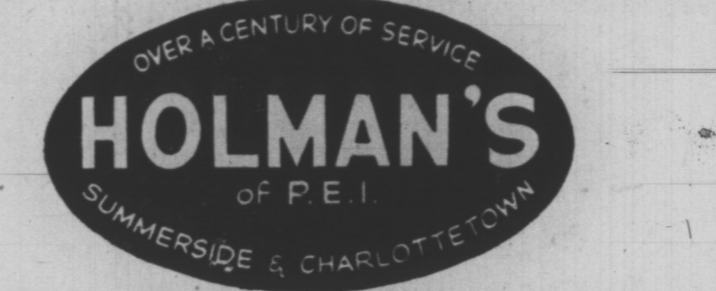
