James M. MacFadyen, 66, a prominent hotel operator, died in the P. E. I. Hospital yesterday morning as the result of a heart attack.

The late Mr. MacFadyen was born in St. Catharines, P.E.I., where he farmed for a short time. He then entered into a partnership with Aben MacLean and operated the MacLean and MacFadyen Grocery Store on Queen Street. He also organized the P. E. I. Motor League with Judge Arsenault.

A few years later Mr. MacFadyen took over the Stanhope Beach Inn and following this acquired the Dalvay Hotel. He sold both north shore establishments later to Mr. and Mrs. Raoul Raymond. Following this he built and operated the Kilonan Lodge, which he continued to operate until his death. For a short time Mr. MacFadyen was also working with

## 16 Boys Arrive Sunday On Educational Tour

Sixteen boys, all students at secondary schools in the immediate Toronto area, accompanied by four officials of Eaton's of Canada, and a representative of the Toronto Board of Education, arrived in the Province tomorrow evening on a three-day visit to Charlottetown.

The boys will be shown the town, the MCA charter flight to Ottawa, and will be recipients of Toronto B. E. I. scholarships based on scholastic ability, personality, and extra-curricular and citizenship endeavors carried out in school.

### AMEND ELECTORAL LAW

CAPETOWN (Reuters) — The South African House of Assembly Friday passed by a vote of 83 to 52 the second reading of the electoral law amendment bill lowering the white voting age to 18 years from 21. The bill will make about 125,000 new eligible voters. White men and women over 21 already enrolled total about 1,500,000. Negroes have four representatives in the 90-seat Senate and three in the 159-seat House of Assembly. Members of both Houses must be white.

Of interest in connection with tomorrow's ceremony at Fort Amherst, commemorating the 200th anniversary of British occupation of Prince Edward Island, is a letter just received by Mrs. W.M. Brehaut, secretary of the P.E.I. Historical Society, from C.C.J. Bond, Cartographer of the Historical Section of the Canadian Army, Ottawa.

Mr. Bond enclosed sketches from original maps, showing Franquet's plan for a projected fort at Port la Joie, along with buildings existing at that time, also a sketch of the harbor and location of Fort Amherst made by Lt. Commander Monat under Surveyor General Holland. Details of much historic interest were also enclosed.

Dealing with Fort Amherst, Mr. Bond notes that it was erected immediately after Lord Rollo, sent by General Amherst, took possession of the Island on Aug. 17, 1758, following the capitulation of Louisbourg. Located 300 yards from the water on Fort Lot, west of Charlottetown harbor, it consisted of a large square redoubt with a broad ditch. Mounting 18 pieces of cannon, it contained some handsome barracks. Soon after it was attacked by the French and Miqmacs, but both attempts failed.

Because it was commanded by higher ground, Governor Patterson had the fort dismantled soon after his appointment (1770). The Governor granted Fort Lot (about 300 acres) including the site of Fort Amherst to a person who reconveyed it to the Governor, whereon he built a handsome farm house and extensive offices.

In 1796 proceedings were instituted against this grant by the Duke of Kent and the buildings and improvements made by Governor Patterson were vacated and fell into decay. For some time after the place was considered
