### NEWS THAT IS INTERESTING IF ACCURATE.

#### A Boer Official Sizes up the Situation.

LONDON, April 30.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Morning Post telegraphing Friday says:

"From a Boer official in the commissariat, I have obtained some interesting details. The Boers had in December 63,000 men. In March they had barely 25,000, having lost 8,000 in killed or wounded and 6,300 in captured. The others are not accounted for but have probably returned to their farms.

"The official who gave me the information predicts that the approach of winter will produce further wholesale shrinkage.

"He says the Boers are short of wagons, wheat and smokeless powder, but that they have plenty of other stores and of rifle ammunition.

"They are not likely, however, to offer serious resistance, as they possess no positions this side of Pretoria that are not capable of being turned by the British army. The official thinks a determined advance by the British would lead the Boers to destroy the Johannesburg mines. Their cleverest general, he says, is De laare, although Botha is a man of great ability. None of the Boer commanders, in his opinion, can be compared with the late General Joubert."

—The rush to the Golden North began today from Seattle and Victoria. Twenty-five steamships are scheduled to leave Seattle during the month of May, 5,833 persons having already engaged passage.

#### BOYS' BRIGADE MEETING.

The adjourned meeting of the staff officers of the Boys' Brigade was held this noon in Kindergarten Hall, with the full staff present. Among other matters the subject of uniforms was discussed and referred to headquarters there to be reported on. Mr. L. B. Miller, of the Charlottetown Business College, presented the Brigade with a Challenge Trophy subject to the following conditions:

1. That it be competed for annually.
2. That it shall remain in the possession of the captain of the winning company for twelve months from date of competition.
3. That it then revert to the donor or his appointee for presentation to the next winning company.
4. That arrangements and other details of competition be made by the staff of the Boys' Brigade in P. E. Island.

The cup was accepted subject to conditions, with thanks.

It was moved by Capt. (Prof.) Watts and seconded by Mr. S. Grey that the competition be along military lines—carried.

The matter of going into camp for one week was discussed, and it was resolved to bring the Summerside contingent to Charlottetown and if possible procure the Military Parade grounds of Victoria Barracks for such purpose.

It is just possible that the boys will go into camp some time along the first part of July.

Rev. Mr. Withycombe was present at the meeting representing the Summerside Brigade.

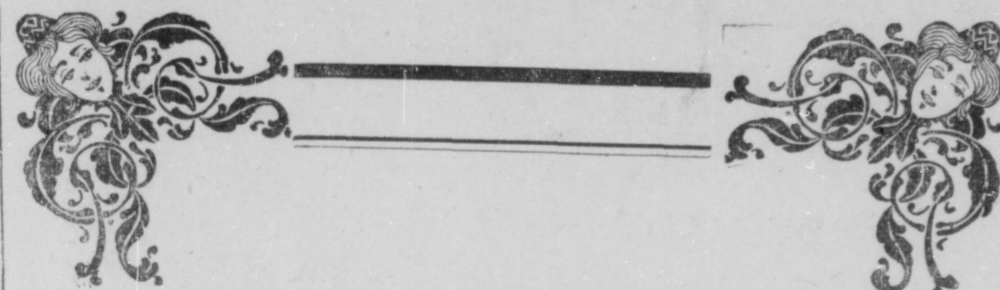

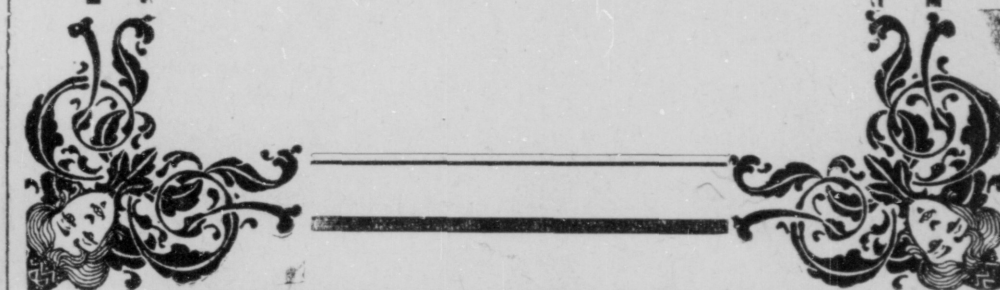
