Walter R. Shaw Delivers Address

Walter R. Shaw, in addressing over 150 persons at the annual meeting of the 4th District of Queens County Progressive Conservative Association held at Eldon Hall Monday evening, stated that: "The Liberal Government in this province has turned between 500 and 600 men out of their jobs since taking office. Men who were doing a good honest day's work. Men who have to support as many as 14 children."

Mr. Shaw, in reference to the free school books, promised by the Liberal Party, suggested that free school books up to Grade 8 this year, fell short of their promise of free books up to Grade 10. He also stated that "the cost of books at the school supplies has doubled in cost since the Campbell Government took office."

The annual meeting was chaired by J. Thomas McKenna with Sinclair MacTavish acting as Secretary. Other speakers during the evening were, Dan Compton and Bennett Carr, the two provincial

candidates in the last election; Jack Kenny, provincial president of the Progressive Conservative Party of P.E.I., Heath MacQuarrie, M.P. and Melvin McQuaid, M.P.

The two Federal members dealt with the federal government's handling of the C.N.R. strike and that the decision for calling Parliament was taken too late by Mr. Pearson. The delay of Medicare by one year and the grave problem that exists in Canada today with inflation and the rise in the cost of living were dealt with as serious problems that face us today.

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CAPTURES FIRST PLACE

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Abrupt Cut In Spending Is Opposed

TORONTO (CP)—The federal government shouldn't cut construction spending abruptly as an anti-inflation measure, Armand Trotter, president of the Canadian Construction Association, said here.

He suggested instead long-range planning for the construction industry.

With intelligent planning, he said the government could have foreseen the need some years ago to cool the industry and gradually reduce spending.

Mr. Trotter, at a news conference, said the construction industry accounts for about 20 per cent of Canada's gross national product. Volume this year is estimated at \$11,100,000,000.

He said increasing taxes doesn't necessarily stop inflation because more money must be earned to pay the taxes.

WANT TO X CUT
The association has been asking the government to drop the 11 per cent sales tax on construction materials.

Mr. Trotter said that because 37 per cent of the companies in the construction business don't make money the association is working on a method of restricting new firms entering the business.

The association wants to see contractors licensed to assure that once in the industry they have a sound financial background and the skills required to do jobs they bid on.

Asked why many construction companies have gone out of business or are having a hard time, he said that when construction jobs are scarce there is tough competition and bids are sometimes low. Also bids made in good weather often prove inadequate when it starts raining.

"You can't foresee everything," he said.

YOU CAN'T WIN

CONFEDERATION CENTRE
MONTREAL (CP)—The Quebec-based Confederation of National Trade Unions labelled the federal anti-inflation measures announced last week by Finance Minister Sharp as "based on the recommendations of big business."

The CNTU said in a statement the measures place all the onus for inflation on Canadians who have only medium-sized incomes.

Mr. Sharp said Thursday Canadians must take a dose of higher taxes as one inflation cure.

He said they also must temper expectations of wage and salary increases, and must drop any hope of coverage next year under a new government medical care program.

CNTU President Marcel Pepin said in a statement of his own that the anti-inflation announcement is "a scandal about which Prime Minister Pearson will have to make the necessary clarifications once he gets back from the Commonwealth conference in London."

"What Mr. Sharp announced in the Commons, the financial interests led him to announce," said Mr. Pepin. "These interests knew of it long before the members of Parliament, and this is proved by the business newspapers."

The CNTU said its own experts will be studying the inflation problem for the information of the union's leadership.

Major Jenkins Dies In Hospital

A widely known resident of this province, Major Lawson Jenkins, MC and Bar, of Vernon died in the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday at the age of 71.

A veteran of two world wars, Major Jenkins was twice awarded the Military Cross for personal gallantry in action. He was a member of the 2nd Siege Battery in World War One, and served with the CASF in World War Two.

On his discharge from the Army in World War One, Major Jenkins returned to Vernon where he operated a general grocery and produce business. Following World War Two, he joined the staff of the Department of Veterans Affairs as Supervisor of Re-establishment Credits. He remained with the

department for 17 years, retiring in October, 1961.

Major Jenkins was a member of the Royal Canadian Legion and the Kiwanis Club of Charlottetown. He was prominent member of Pownal United Church and was elected to the eldership.

He is survived by his wife, the former Elizabeth Weatherbie, a son Stanton of Truro, N.S., and two daughters, Beth, Mrs. Brian Cudmore of Charlottetown and Olga, Mrs. Bloyce Carter of Hudson, N.Y. A son, Russel, predeceased him in May of this year.

Also surviving are a brother, Milton of Pownal, and a sister, Mabel, Mrs. Kelsey Burhoe, Charlottetown.

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GAS STORAGE SPARKS ANGER

LONDON (AP) — Reports that Britain's nationalized gas company plans to put up a gas storage tank 400 yards from ancient Windsor Castle caused shock and alarm in Britain.

"Gasholder on the royal doorstep?" says a front-page headline in The Sun. "Never," Gasholder may overshadow Windsor." says a headline in The Times.

Windsor Castle, home of English monarchs since 1127, is 21 miles west of London. Its great round tower overlooks the town of Windsor and dominates the skyline for miles.

The Times says a 250-foot gas tank planned by the North Thames Gas Board, "would be taller than the round tower, which rises 215 feet above the (Thames) river."

In Windsor, reaction was indignant. "I cannot conceive that such a monstrosity would be tolerated by the government," said Foriss Mellor, secretary of the Windsor and Eaton Society's architectural planning and landscape subcommittee.

The gas board hedged a bit Monday, a spokesman saying: "We could do it, but we have no immediate intention of doing it."
