

OPENING OF THE NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATURE.

The Legislature of Nova Scotia was opened on Saturday, the 16th inst., by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, Sir Fenwick Williams. His Excellency congratulated the members on the peace and prosperity of the Province, and of their exemption from any invasion of lawless men. The public accounts, which would be laid before them, would exhibit the finances of the country in a state of unprecedented prosperity, the revenue greatly exceeding that of 1866. His Excellency expressed his regret that the Government of the United States have adhered to their policy of last year, obstructing that trade which under the Reciprocity Treaty was so beneficial to their own country as well as to the Province. He said the abrogation of the Treaty, had in some respects been productive of good, by uniting more closely the interests and the Trade of the North American Colonies. In reference to Confederation, His Excellency said:—

"I rejoice to be able to congratulate you upon the success which has attended the Delegation sent by me under your authority to confer with Her Majesty's Government on the Union of the Colonies. The papers relating to this important subject will be immediately laid before you. In the firm conviction that the Union of Canada, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, upon the terms provided in the Bill submitted by Her Majesty's Government to the Imperial Parliament, will largely increase the prosperity of all these Provinces, and contribute to the strength and stability of those British Institutions which it is their good fortune to enjoy, I commend to your consideration such changes and amendments in our existing laws as may be found necessary."

The graduating exercises of the New England Female College, took place in Boston on the 6th inst. The degree of Doctor of Medicine was conferred on five young ladies composing the graduating class.

Gen. Howard, of the United States, reports that 32,622 whites, and 24,238 colored people in the South, will need food from some source, before the next crop can relieve them.

Charles F. Brown, known in his humorous writings as Ardena Ward, died in Southampton, England, on the 6th of March inst. He was born in Waterville, Maine, in 1834; left home when quite young and commenced his career as a type setter. Last year he went to England where he has been a contributor to London Punch, and has drawn full houses as a humorous lecturer.

The Governor of Castile, Spain, proclaims that the persons who tell, write or print papers against the religion of the Queen or Government, shall be punished by death.

A letter from Vera Cruz, states that 8,000 French troops had sailed for France, and one vessel had sailed with Austrian troops. Maximilian's yacht was in the harbor with her steam up, and Maximilian was daily expected to sail for Europe.

We learn that the ice at the head of the river, in the channel, is open. The ice between this place and the landing at Bedouque, is still safe and good.

For want of space we are obliged to leave it for our next number. Our readers no doubt wish to see everything that is written both for and against this great question, and we take this opportunity of informing the public that our columns are open to temperately written articles in favor of or against Confederation.

We are pleased to learn that the Summerside section of the Rev. Mr. Frame's Congregation, which has halted its services, at a meeting held on Monday evening last, after subscribing a large amount to assist in clearing the debt of their commodious and elegant Church, unanimously agreed to pay their Pastor one hundred pounds per annum.

The Free Masons of Summerside and Saint Eleanor's held a meeting in the Lodge Room in this Town on Tuesday evening last, to discuss the propriety and possibility of building a Masonic Hall in Summerside. Committees were appointed to enquire into the cost of erecting a building of moderate size and to choose a suitable site. We sincerely hope that the proceedings of the meeting will be followed up by effective action. One of the most pressing wants of Summerside is a spacious Hall in which to hold public meetings. We believe that looked upon merely in the light of a mercantile speculation, a public building of the kind projected by the Masonic Fraternity, would be a complete success. The lower story of such a building would be a convenient place for public offices, such as Post Office, Custom House and Court Room, all of which are much needed.

We have received the Circular of Messrs Kirkwood, Livingstone & Co., of Montreal, for the month of March. It gives the state of the markets, and is especially devoted to the prices of Flour and Wheat. It says that Importers have already received a large portion of their Spring goods. The latest despatches from the British manufacturing districts report decidedly dull markets; and the tendency of prices to decline.

The Militia have been called out in Summerside for ten days.

ERRATUM.—In the Election returns published in our paper of the 14th inst., for William Grigg 106 votes, read 206.

We were not aware until recently that the House of Congress in the United States met on Sunday for business, but such is the case. It does not speak much for the piety of that enlightened country.
