Hay was in moderate supply at 50 to 55 cents per 100 lbs. with the demand fair. In case the supply and demand were equally low, what offered bringing 35 cents per bushel. Potatoes were also scarce at 17 cents per bushel.

Still it was hard to believe that a temperance man like Joseph, as he distinguished himself not long since in trying to enforce the Scott Act, should be found manufacturing the stuff for sale to pious vendors. Recent revelations, however, have placed the matter beyond doubt, and now this great temperance reformer of Little Harbor is in the hands of the law. On Friday's evening he and his wife were arrested and taken to Souris in the morning, where he was marched on board the train for Charlottetown. McLellan's brand of whiskey is known locally as the "Jack the Ripper brand."

THE RE-DISTRIBUTION BILL.

Major-General Herbert's Report on Worsley and Murray.

OTTAWA, June 14. The debate on the re-distribution Bill took up almost all the time of the House yesterday.

In reply to Flint, Mr. Bowell said that the Major-General commanding had made reports setting forth the result of his investigation into the charges against Lieut.-Col. Worsley and Lieut.-Col. Murray of the Halifax District. The Major-General did not make any recommendation as to the dismissal or the retention of these officers. The report was still under consideration of the Government.

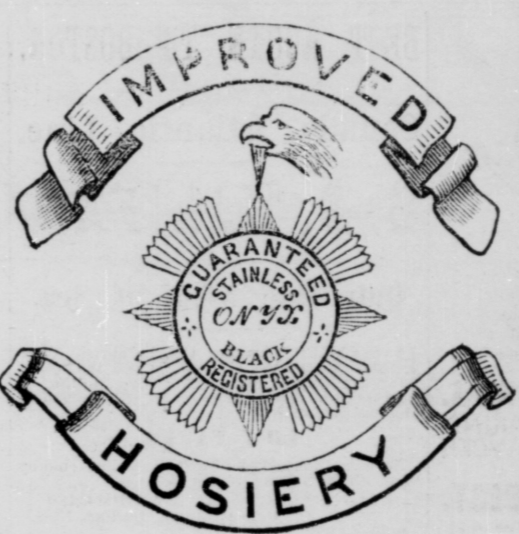
