

Start Scheduled On Prince Survey

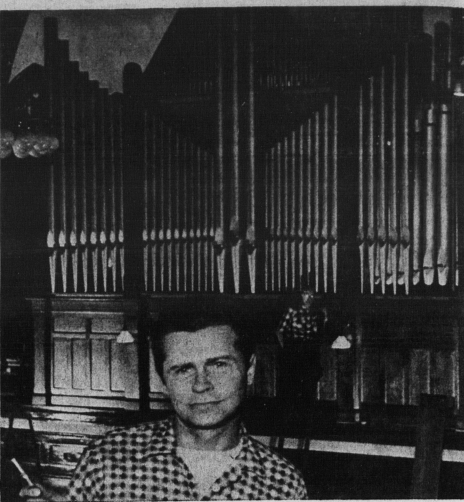

Groundwork for an economic survey of Prince County will be laid this week as provincial research director Hartwell Daley meets with Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development officials from Ottawa and Nova Scotia.

The survey, announced some time ago will look into all aspects of potential economic development of the county, including transportation, tourist development, secondary agriculture, industries, small business growth and fisheries.

J.D. Conlon, Amherst, the chief engineer of the Maritime Marshall Reclamation Program arrived yesterday to confer with Mr. Daley.

Arriving later in the week will be Dr. Balour Kristianson, special projects officer of the federal department of agriculture, and Ralph Stult, of the department's division of economics.

Chief discussions at this week's meeting, said Mr. Daley, "will be the survey which will cover Prince County from Miscouche to North Cape. The main operation should produce a practical master plan for the development of the area."

The Alberton Cancer Unit, which was formed last month, April 1963, one of the coldest and snow-covered Aprils in history.

Late Storms Turned April Mean, Miserable

LONDON (AP) — Britain's ministry of agriculture has found that mice can crawl straight up the side of 10-foot-high "mouseproof" walls.

"Our dentists were staggered," said the ministry's pest officer, Dennis Burgess, said here.

One of Britain's biggest food stores had appealed to the government for help against mice forecasting was costing them thousands of pounds. The company installed steel doors, concrete floors and brick walls around warehouses.

The mice still nibbled relentlessly.

The ministry put a family of eight under night-day observation.

Three mice scrambled straight up the 10-foot vertical wall.

The others went to a point six feet up, rested a bit and wiggled to the top.

The scientists also learned that mice can leap 27 inches.

But the scientists said they found a simple solution.

They recommended sealing all holes and gaps, and to demolish the mice's climbing, using two coats of high gloss paint on all walls.

The mice show they may not be able to grip high gloss paint," said Burgess. "They fail to get ground and become discouraged."

U.S. Co. Seeks Million Pounds Of Live Eels

HALIFAX (CP) — A United States firm has a market for 1,000,000 pounds of live eels and has advertised for Nova Scotia fishermen to help out.

General Commodore of Passadunk, Me., plans to visit the province next week to negotiate.

A federal fisheries department spokesman said that about 119,000 pounds of eels were caught in Nova Scotia waters last year. He believed the U.S. requirement could be met by the province's fishing.

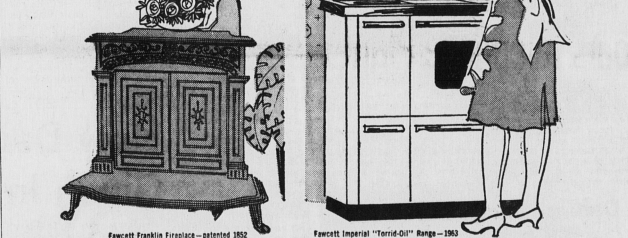
