Blame Seaway For Cement Shortage

TORONTO (CP)—Construction of the St. Lawrence seaway has been blamed partially for an acute cement shortage in Canada. Norman Fraser, manager of

the Toronto Builders' Exchange, said an annual fall shortage is even more acute this year. The seaway undoubtedly had something to do with it. F. William Purdy, a member and former vice-president of the Canadian Construction Association, said building is at a peak because builders are trying to get roofed in before winter. He described the situation as the worst since the war. A cement firm official said supplies of steel and gypsum are also scarce. He predicted the present cement shortage will not last more than a month.






