SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Attempted Suicide. HALIFAX, Oct. 14. Robert A. Murdoch, traveller for the dry goods firm of Murdoch Nephews, who on Sunday night last, while suffering from the effects of alcoholism, attacked an American tourist while the latter was at his supper at a city hotel, endeavored to commit suicide by cutting his throat with a jackknife at the hospital yesterday. A convalescent inmate of the institution who was near by heard the noise made by the unfortunate man as he cut his throat, and was on the scene in time to not only prevent a suicide, but to keep him from inflicting any more damage than a slight cut. The wound is not a serious one and Murdoch will recover from it. Perils of the Deep. VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Oct. 14. The northeast gale continues, raging furiously. There has been no mail to or from this island since Saturday. Steamers are unable to run and a large fleet of vessels are anchored. The schooner Mary R. Oliver, of and from Georgetown, Me., for New York, sprang a leak and sunk. NANTUCKET, Mass., Oct. 14. A one hundred-ton ship is ashore off Long Hill. The wrecking crew went to her this afternoon and found nobody on board. She is partially sunk. Her name could not be ascertained. LONDON, Oct. 14. The steamer Critic, at Leith from New York, encountered fearful weather. During the passage two firemen were swept overboard and drowned. HALIFAX, Oct. 14. The brigantine Clare, of Yarmouth, has been abandoned at sea. The crew were landed at North Sydney by the steamer Cypress.

Appeals in seven election cases will be heard, including Queen's and Prince Counties, P. E. Island, and King's and Shelburne, Nova Scotia.

HE'S THE MAN.—Detective Skeffington and policeman Macdonald, of Amherst, arrested here last evening after Thomas Davison. They had a warrant for Davison's apprehension for breaking jail at Amherst in August, 1890, while awaiting sentence on two charges of robbery from the person. Davison denied ever since his arrest that he was the man it was suspected he was, but he weakened last evening when brought face to face with Skeffington, and admitted that he was the man wanted. Since Davison's escape from jail he has been raving in the West-Indian States. Davison is well known to the police of the other provinces, and has served three years in the penitentiary at Rochester for entering a store and robbing the cash box. He is a nephew of John Williams, who was given four months for larceny from Mr. Chowan a day or two ago. He and Williams are two precious rascals, and Marshal Cameron and the officers who arrested them are entitled to the thanks of the community for putting them behind the bars.
