But the grand old traditions of the Royal Navy remain, and its achievements in as late a period as the Second World War are an imperishable part of history.

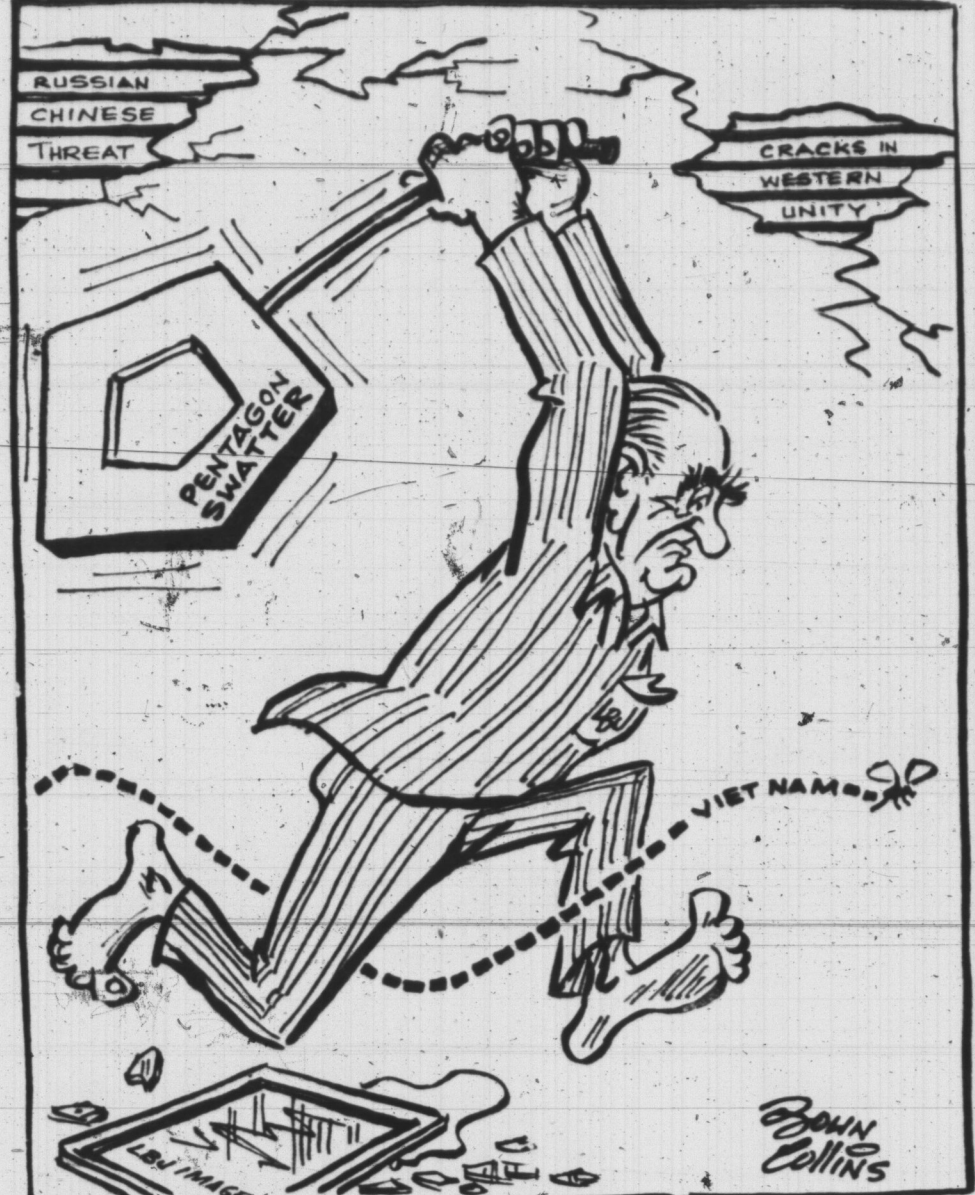
