LOST HIS HORSE.—Mr. J. A. Murphy met with a serious loss on the 14th inst., in the drowning of his very valuable driving horse, which happened near 7.30 Point while his brother, Mr. B. Murphy, was returning from Lot 16. A fog had settled down upon the ice, rendering the course indiscernible, and Mr. Murphy kept too close to the land, where an opening makes early. Mr. Murphy had a narrow escape from drowning, having broken through the ice several times in endeavoring to help the horse out.—Summerside Journal.

WILL GET NO DIVIDEND.—A Montreal despatch says: The creditors of the defunct firm of J. C. & G. D. Warrington, wholesale cheese exporters of this city, will in all probability get no dividend from the estate. This, however, is not a matter of surprise, as it has been generally acknowledged ever since the failure of the firm took place that matters were in a most deplorable condition, and that there were practically no assets. The claims filed with the curator, Mr. John W. Ross, amount to \$275,000, and he states in a report he has issued that there are practically no assets.

THE UNLUCKY THIRTEEN.—Peculiar features in regard to the superstition connected with the number 13 were involved in the death of James Powers, window washer, at Chicago, happening as it did on the 13th of the month. He was employed on July 13, 1898, to take the place of John Miller, a window washer, who met his death on that day, falling from the same window from which Powers fell. The window is the thirteenth window from the ground. The dead man was 26 years old—twice 13. Miller, the first man to meet his death from that unlucky window, had worked just 39 days—three times 13—when he fell and was killed.

The calm like a tuft of down.


The far-off gurgling stream
