On Thursday evening, the 29th ult., several gentlemen met in the Drawing Room of the Bishop's palace to promote, by united and intelligent action, the cause of total abstinence. In various parishes throughout the Island, Temperance Societies have been in existence for many years, but their good effects, owing to the want of a well-directed organization, have been less than is desirable.

TURKS REINFORCED.

THE POPE'S HEALTH.

LONDON, Dec. 4. A dispatch confirms the report that the Russians, in attempting to push the way from Etropol and seize the southern junction roads to Etropol Orchaite, were repulsed with heavy loss.

Khedive of Egypt has sent the Sultan six thousand additional troops.

Mueklar Pasha is fortifying Erzeroum.

The Pope was insensible three hours on Sunday, caused by inflammation rising above his knees. His legs are altogether benumbed.

It is reported that the Turks disembarked at Dulchigug. The citadel has not been taken.

The Montenegrins have re-occupied Suforina.

The Austrian Government refused to allow a flag to be hoisted on the strip of Turkish territory intersecting Dalmatia.

Kossuth, in a speech on the Eastern Question, urges Austria to maintain the independence of Turkey and summon the Council for conference.

The chief stronghold of the Jomukas has been taken by the British.
