**Kingly Kindness.**

The King of Denmark is one of the kindest of men. A few years ago a gentleman presented himself in the Salle des Pas Perdus at one of the public receptions which the King gives nearly every Monday, and was in due time ushered into the Royal presence, when he startled his Majesty by formally asking for the hand of his daughter, the Princess Thyra. He was, he stated, and which was perfectly true, of good family, had taken all his degrees at the university, and as he was able to maintain a wife and had fallen in love with the princess, he came to ask for her hand. The King, of course, at once understood that he had to do with a madman; and with his usual tact and kindness of heart, which so completely have won him the affection of his subjects, he thanked M. X. for his offer, but thought it necessary first to consult with the Queen, as well as to ascertain the sentiments of his daughter, before he gave a final reply. The poor fellow was quite satisfied, but was later by his family sent to a private lunatic asylum for some time, and he is now walking the streets at Copenhagen, a most inoffensive and, in his lucid moods, a most intelligent and highly-educated gentleman.

**Mr. Gladstone at Rhyl.**

A great Liberal gathering took place at Rhyl, England, on the 1st inst. After a conference in the morning of the Liberals of North Wales, Mr. Gladstone presided in the evening at a public meeting in the Skating Rink attached to the Winter Gardens. The Duke of Westminster moved a resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Osborne Morgan, M. P., expressing unflinching faith in the right hon. gentleman as a statesman and patriot, and thanking him for the efforts he had made to expose and counteract the secret and imperious policy of the Prime Minister. Mr. Gladstone, in reply, justified the prominent part he had taken in criticising and condemning the action of the Government. He complained of the absence of information in regard to the entanglement with the Ameer of Afghanistan, and asked whether, in censuring the acts of Russia, we were prepared to justify our own interference with the Ameer and the frontier States of India. He contrasted the position of the country now with what it was when the late Government left office, and said that "Peace with honor" really meant depressed trade and commerce, broken treaties, mystery, breaches of law, and the usurpation of the privileges of the Crown.

**Miscellaneous News.**

Germans report that Bismarck weighs 243 pounds, a gain of forty-three pounds in four years.

The Committee on Wesleyan Methodist Finance has decided to establish Methodist middle-class schools throughout England, and to make a provisional grant of £10,000 in aid of such establishment.

The Begum of Bhopal, who has placed her whole force at the disposition of England should there be an Afghan war, acts like her mother, the late Begum, who gave the Queen valuable assistance during the mutiny, and was rewarded by an extension of territory and the decoration of K. G. C. of the Star of India. This decoration was also conferred upon her daughter, whom she had trained carefully to be a wise and sagacious ruler, and when the Prince of Wales held the Grand Chapter of the order at Calcutta, the appearance of the little woman, veiled from head to foot, amid the throng of great Indian princes, attracted much attention.

As a writer of post-cards and short notes to strangers, Mr. Gladstone, the *Saturday Review* thinks, has never been approached, and adds: "It behooves us to take care of them and to store them up for posterity. For posterity will find in them a very complete record of most of the insignificant movements of our time. Manifestations of human imbecility that would scarcely attract a less comprehensive mind have for him a peculiar fascination. Every little prejudice, as its hour of death draws near, seeks as its last glade a sympathetic post-card from Mr. Gladstone, and there are few that seek in vain. His sovereign mind has almost been entirely converted into small change, so that there may be alms for all."

The bold declaration of Premier Tisza in the Diet as to the attitude of Austro-Hungary and her determination to see that the Treaty of Berlin is carried out honestly by Russia is a good omen. Austria has so long pursued a vacillating and selfish policy that it is safe to assume now that she is sure of strong support from some quarter against Russia, else she would not be so free to throw down the gauntlet to her. The exasperation which seems to prevail in Russia, judging from the tone of the press, is probably the result of a knowledge that a league is being formed against her ambitious designs. All this is, of course, calculated to make the Muscovite morose and unhappy.—*St. John Telegraph.*
