Fire Causes Damage At Home In Montrose Monday Morning

Fire of unknown origin yesterday morning caused heavy damage to the kitchen and a small adjoining room at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Murray Gulliver in Montrose.

The fire was first discovered by several small children who ran to the barn where Mr. and Mrs. Gulliver, her father Mr. Harry Pridham and several other men were grading potatoes. After removing the children in the home to safety, the group of people went quickly to work and managed to extinguish the flames with water from the pump. Walls and door frames in the two rooms were almost completely burned through and the greater part of winter clothing for eight children was lost.

A call was made for the Alberton Fire Dept. but a broken piston in the fire truck held the vehicle at Oliver's Hill about two miles from Alberton.

It is understood some insurance was carried.

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Teachers Hold Meeting At Alberton High

A well attended meeting of the Alberton teachers workshop was held in the Alberton High School on November 5th with Mrs. Earle Atkinson, presiding.

The purpose of the meeting was to allow teachers to express their views on topics of their interests and benefits.

An unanimous agreement followed as a solution to the first topic, which asked how more teachers and better teachers could be sought? The answer was more money. This money is sought not for the sake of money itself but rather as a means to make the teaching profession more attractive. The result of this would be teachers striving for perfection having something worthwhile to strive for.

The second topic on the agenda asked how local workshops could be more active. The result of this necessarily followed from the first question already discussed. It was decided that more union was needed between local workshops in order to achieve their aims. This was considered the first and only step toward an organization of teachers. Only by a provincial union of workshops can the desires of teachers be achieved.

It was decided that the Federation should once more approach the Provincial Government for an increase in teachers' salaries.

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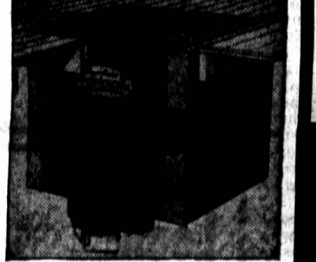
