Ottawa Man Is Remanded On False Pretences Charge

Charged in City Police Court with false pretences, Raymond Joseph Moore of Ottawa, was remanded without bail until Monday, August 24th, by Magistrate K. M. Martin, yesterday.

Moore is specifically charged with obtaining money by false pretences with intent to defraud by passing a worthless cheque in the amount of \$25 at the Charlottetown branch of the Bank of Montreal.

At his arraignment yesterday the accused, who was not represented by counsel, entered a plea of guilty to the charge.

Police Arrest Suspected Man

About 9:00 o'clock yesterday a Charlottetown man was taken into custody by the City Police on the suspicion of theft. The arrested man is slated to appear in City Police Court this morning.

He is suspected of having stolen a quantity of groceries from the property of the Central Farmer's Co-operative store in Charlottetown, valued at less than \$50.

Also on the docket at a resident of Charlottetown and another from Clyde River, both charged with being drunk and incapable were each given ten day suspended sentences. For similar offences two city men drew fines of \$20 and costs or ten days in jail, and a Bunsbury man \$10 and costs or five days.

The bouquet, bearing a greeting card but no signature, was delivered at Balmoral Castle along with banks of birthday blooms from all over the world. The only man who knew the American's identity was florist William Stott in nearby Aberdeen. He wouldn't tell. His orders arrived by cable from the United States. Last weekend the American had Stott send the princess three dozen red roses. The mystery provided just about the only faint flavor of romance to mark the commencement of Margaret's 30th year. There was no eligible suitor on hand to join the family birthday gathering at Balmoral—the royal Scottish residence where Margaret has celebrated 22 of her previous birthdays. The highlight of the daytime was a picnic. Margaret trooped out with other members of the family to a play spot on Balmoral estate near the shores of Loch Muick. The sun shone brightly just as it did when Princess Anne went out for a birthday jaunt at the same spot last Saturday.

IN COURT IN 15 MINUTES

Prisoners Climb Fence But RCMP Foils Attempt

Freedom was short-lived for two inmates of the Queens County Jail, George Ernest Hughes and Frederick Elwood Weeks, both of Charlottetown. Within minutes of their breakout yesterday afternoon the two were captured by members of the RCMP and arraigned before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q. C., in Queens County Magistrate Court, which was in session at the time of the escape Friday afternoon.

While on a routine patrol Constables W.J.R. MacDonald and J.O. Murray observed the two men slipping away from the vicinity of the jail. Figuring that they might be escaping the two observed policemen quickly nabbed the two accused and checking with the jailer found that their suspicions were correct. Charge and arraignment followed almost immediately. Both police officers are members of the Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP. PLEAD GUILTY. Hughes who had been imprisoned for 10 days and Weeks who was serving 20 days, awarded by the city magistrate, both pleaded guilty to charges of unlawfully being at large from the Queens County Jail. Having elected trial by magistrate the accused men were remanded until Wednesday, August 26th for sentencing.

A further remand until Monday, August 24th was given to Bernice Margaret Bisso, Charlottetown, who is charged with the unlawful possession of stolen goods. At yesterday afternoon's session the final witness for the crown, Sgt. James H. Maloney, RCMP, was heard. He stated that on August 7th he accompanied Sgt. J. Davies to the Island Grill where they interviewed the accused in the driveway to the rear of the building. At the time, he said, the accused was wearing a wristwatch, which Sgt. Maloney identified when it was produced to him in court. DISCOVERY MADE. He also testified that he was present when the bag of money and the man's cuff link set were found in the suitcase in the room of the accused. He stated that along with Sgt. Davies he accompanied Mrs. Bisso to the Queens County Jail, when she was taken there to visit William Wendel Larkin. Sgt. Maloney testified he overheard the accused tell Larkin that the Mounties had found the stuff, (money and jewellery). He said that Larkin told the accused to say nothing "they (the police) can't prove you done any of the breaks". The latter also told Mrs. Bisso to tell the police that she had saved the money. Also on the docket, a fine of \$20 and costs or 10 days was imposed upon a North Rustico man following his conviction on the charge of committing an indecent act (urinating) in a public place. Chief Electoral Officer Gets Credit For Speed

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The co-operation of chief electoral officer Nehemiah Short, enabled Canadians to learn the Newfoundland election result Thursday in record time. The Canadian Press reported at 9:18 p.m. NDT that the votes supplied by Mr. Short's office indicated re-election of Premier Smallwood's Liberal government. The first member elected was Liberal Raymond Guy in Grand Falls, 40 minutes after the polls closed at 8 p.m. NDT.

In the 1949 Newfoundland election, the province's first after Confederation, the result was not available until three days later. The Liberal victory of 1951 was not certain until the night after election day.

Progressive Conservative Leader Malcolm Hollett, beaten in Thursday's election, conceded the 1956 election to the Liberals about two hours after the polls closed. Labrador South was the only seat from which no result at all was available Thursday night. Static prevented transmission of poll counts by wireless. The final CP standing of the night issued at 12:45 a.m. NDT showed the Liberals with 30 members, the PCs with three, the United Newfoundland party two and one doubtful.

The only member elected by acclamation was Uriah Strickland, a Liberal, in Trinity South. Voters chose from a record number of candidates—33 Liberals, 32 PCs, 19 NDPs and nine UNPs.

(Continued from Page 1) tion in the House of Assembly. I'm going to stick by the PC party to the very end." Meanwhile, Mr. Smallwood has a five-year term in which to tell the rest of Canada that Newfoundland was betrayed when the federal government decided to discontinue the special Term 29 payments in 1962. When the election was called with only 21 days notice it appeared that Term 29 would be the only major issue. But with less than three weeks to prepare the voters, the Newfoundland Democratic party jumped into the campaign but failed to elect a member. The Democrats headed by Ed. Finn, Jr., wanted to repeal labor legislation that decertified two locals of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) while one of them was on strike against the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company. Mr. Finn blamed at least part of the Democrats failure on the distribution of ballot boxes. "We are not at all happy with the election arrangements made by the Smallwood machine." Loggers especially were "deprived" of their franchise because ballot boxes were not placed in woods camps. And there were no advance polls, he said. The Democrats plan to "build an organization which will be opened to all fair minded citizens of this province."

LOSES TO BALLAM

Mr. Finn was defeated in his initial attempt to enter politics by Labor Minister C. H. Ballam in Humber East. Minor cabinet changes—possibly only one—are expected as a result of the balloting. Although his cabinet was re-elected, the premier has a vacancy left by the resignation July 28 of Provincial Affairs Minister S. J. Heferton. Liberal candidates elected in-

P.E.I. IS POLIO FREE. Despite the incidence of polio in Montreal and various sections of Newfoundland which in some cases were almost of epidemic proportions, Prince Edward Island remains polio free. No cases of the disease have been reported to Health authorities here in the past two years.
