## Heavier Potato Shipments To Markets In Canada

Seed and tablestock shipments from the Province during the month of November by rail, truck and water amounted to 1,982 carloads. Of these 1,574 cars were tablestock while 408 were seed.

Shipments this fall to the Canadian market have been much heavier than to the American market when the situation was reversed last fall. The movement to Canadian markets for November was as follows: By rail, 1,234 cars; by water, 190; by truck 96. The American market took only 27 cars by rail and 26 cars by truck. One and a half cars were shipped by water to the Island of St. Pierre.

Although the shipments of tablestock from the Island during November, 1953 were higher than this year's 1,574 (1,868), it is interesting to note that the American market handled 588 cars last year compared to this year's 53. Officials of the Fruit and Vegetable branch point out that the price being paid on the Canadian market this year is considerably higher than that paid on the American points which would explain the larger movement in Canada.

Shipments are moving in a more general pattern from all island assembly points with extra heavy movement at Souris, Kensington, Albany, Elmsdale and Charlottetown.

Of the 408 carloads of seed shipped, 51 left the Island by water; 349 by rail and eight cars by truck. All the seed shipped went to the American market, with the major part going to Florida.

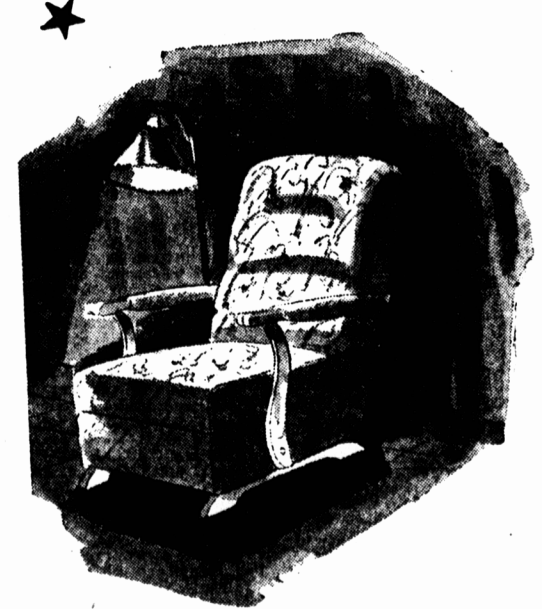

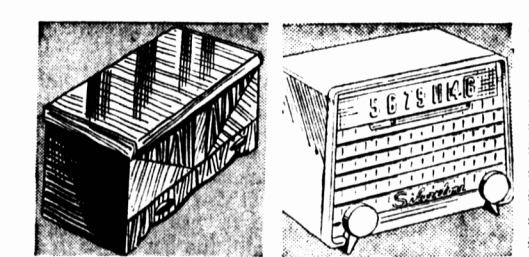

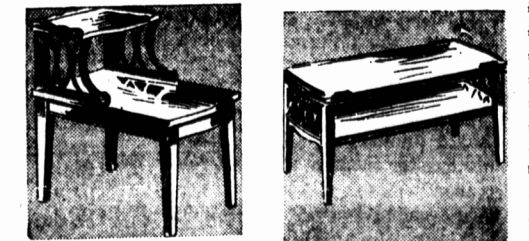
