Wendell Phillips and Blaine.

When Wendell Phillips was last in Washington, he was for a few minutes on the floor of the United States senate, surrounded by a group of senators, among whom was Senator James G. Blaine, always a favorite with Mr. Phillips. It so happened that a few weeks before this time Mr. Blaine, in presenting to congress the statue of Governor King, first governor of Maine, to be placed in the rotunda of the capitol, had commented severely on the loyalty of Massachusetts, and especially the Federalist party, during the war with Great Britain in 1812.

Of this party the father of Wendell Phillips, John Phillips, was a conspicuous member. When Blaine's speech was made Dawes and Hoar were senators from Massachusetts, and they both essayed some sort of an impromptu reply thereto, but did themselves little credit in parrying the thrusts of Blaine's glittering rapier.

So, when Wendell Phillips met Blaine on this occasion, he said to him laughingly, "I wish I had been a member of this body for about an hour the other day when you made that speech attacking the Massachusetts Federalists."

"Ah," said Mr. Blaine with that ready wit which never deserted him, "if you had been here I shouldn't have made that speech!"—Harper's Magazine.

Local and Other Items.

BAZAAR.—There will be every variety of candy at Kindergarten Hall on December 7th, and Santa Claus intends to buy most of his Christmas present and toys there.

NEW ADVERTISING IDEA.—The giddiest suits of a Maine football team this year are being worn by the Waterville High School boys, for they have the advertisements for liberal local merchants painted on the backs of the blouses. They charge each merchant \$3.00, and paint eleven suits. This sum pays for the suits, but the advertisement has not been found to be of great value after an opposing team has crowded the boys into the mud of the gridiron a few times.

TARTE SCORES AGAIN.—The reason why the Government did not insure the Canadian troops is the circumstance that it did not pay the premium. It made all arrangements; it announced that it had completed the bargain; it allowed the men to go under the belief that the insurance had been effected. Then it backed out and issued a declaration that there was no truth in the report that action was contemplated. The malign influence had stepped in to prevent the carrying out of a good intention.—Mail and Empire.

AN IMPORTANT MEETING.—It is announced from Ottawa that a meeting of officers commanding districts will be held in Ottawa from Wednesday, 15th inst. until Friday, 17th, to consider agenda which had been prepared, and of which copies have been already forwarded to all concerned. The following officers will attend: Officers commanding military districts 1, 3 and 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 and 12; the acting district officer commanding military district No. 7, and Major Young, commanding Royal Canadian regiment. The opening meeting will be held in railway committee room of House of Commons.

EVICTED IRISH TENANTS.—There is a movement in Ireland to improve the condition of those evicted tenants who lost their homes during the recent land struggle. A committee has been formed whose object is to restore the tenants to their homes where these are available, or to provide for them elsewhere in cases where their former homesteads have passed into other hands. The committee which includes many prominent politicians, churchmen and mayors has just issued an appeal for funds. The evicted tenants are supposed to number about eight hundred.

CHEESE BOARD.—At the meeting of the cheese board yesterday 11 factories boarded 3433 cheese, Dillon & Spillet bought 2033 at 19 13 16 which is 1-16c higher than the highest bid at Brookville on Thursday. The following factories sold: Stanley Bridge, New Glasgow, New Dominion, St. Peter's, Kensington, Hazelbrook and Dunstaffnage. On motion of Arthur Simpson seconded by R. Munroe, it was agreed to adjourn the board for the season, the first meeting next year to be at the call of the officers. Moved by Arthur Simpson seconded by L. L. Jenkins and Donald Currie and carried, unanimously that the thanks of the board be tendered Premier Farquharson and the Government for allowing the board the free use of a room in the Provincial building in which to hold their meetings. A vote of thanks was tendered the officers for the manner in which they conducted the business of the board for the season.
