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Veteran Teachers, School Board Member Honored

Mrs. Joseph B. Wood and Miss Estelle Bowness, who have spent 40 years in the teaching profession, and Dr. E. T. Tanton, who has served 36 years on the School Board, were honored last evening at a dinner at the Summerside High School prepared by the students of the home economics class.

Attending this dinner were the present members of the School Board and other guests.

The two teachers are retiring from the teaching staff at the end of this school term, and Dr. Tanton retired from the School Board this week.

Mrs. Wood has taught at the Summerside High School for 37 years and also taught for three years in Western Canada.

Miss Bowness spent 26 of her teaching years in Summerside. After attending Prince of Wales College, she taught for a year in North St. Eleanor's, and a year at Alpha before proceeding to Western Canada where she taught school for nine years.

On returning to the Island Miss Bowness taught for five years at Alberton before coming to Summerside.

She has been an active member of the Teachers' Federation and served for three years as president. She is at present a member of the Board of Governors of that organization.

Dr. Tanton, until his retirement this week, served with the School Board since 1917, and was chairman of the board when the present Academy was built in the 1930's.

He estimates that upwards of one thousand students had passed through grades eleven and twelve since his inception with resultant savings of one million dollars to the parents of Summerside students.

Mr. D. O. Stewart, chairman of the School Board presided at last evening's dinner, prepared by the Grade X girls of the home economics class under the direction of their teacher, Mrs. Allison MacLean.

Mayor Gordon, on behalf of the Town Council, presented each of the three guests of honor with a beautiful clock, and each responded with appropriate replies, recalling some of the events occurring during their years of service.

Mr. Clarence Mercer, school supervisor, added his wishes to the three guests on behalf of the entire teaching staff.

At a special meeting of the O'Leary ratepayers held last evening in the High School, it was decided to build class accommodation for grade 11 and to increase present class room facilities. The meeting was presided over by Dr. L. G. Dewar.

Two new rooms and a teachers' room will be built as an extension to the south of the present four-room building and will include a full size basement. It was noted at the meeting that the enrollment has increased from 100 to 150 in the last five years.

The school trustees are Claude Jelly, Upton Seaman and Wendall Turner.

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Expect Large Turnout At Blood Clinics

The R.C.A.F. Station and the Town of Summerside are vying with each other today to keep up with the record attendance figures established in Charlottetown earlier in the week at the Red Cross blood donor clinics.

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Moncton Man Heads United Church Conference

SACKVILLE, N. B. (CP)—Rev. F. E. Archibald, of St. John's Church at Moncton, N. B., was elected president of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada on the third ballot Wednesday. He succeeded Rev. H. T. Jones, Shediac, N. B.

Others nominated for the office were Rev. W. McE. Mathews, Truro; Rev. John MacDonald, Liverpool; Rev. B. C. Salter, Valley River; Rev. C. F. MacLennan, New Glasgow; and Rev. W. K. MacKay, Bass River, all in Nova Scotia. Mr. MacLennan and Mr. MacKay withdrew their names before the voting.

Rev. James A. Fraser, Imperial, N. S., and Rev. E. D. Murray, Halifax, were unanimously re-elected secretary and assistant secretary respectively.

The new president presented the report of the conference publication, the United Churchman, showing a circulation of 6,117, the highest in its history.

Dr. C. H. Johnson, Halifax, reporting for the committee on archives, told of the collecting and indexing of valuable historical material in connection with early congregationalism, methodism and presbyterianism, wherever available, be sent to the committee.

Major O. R. Crowell of Halifax announced the first Maritime conference of United Churches will be held on the camp ground at Berwick, N. S., July 31, August 1 and 2 with Dr. Douglas Wilson of the Montreal Star as special speaker. He appealed for a large attendance of laymen.
