Churches Must Disperse Presbyterians Are Told

"The church must disperse or we are finished. The organizational strength is not important. We must take life into the highways and byways," said Rev. Walter Kennedy of Hamilton, Ont., as he opened the Eastern Conference of Presbyterian Men at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Truro over the weekend.

"Too many people have joined the church to be ministered rather than to minister," he stated.

Approximately 60 men from various corners of the Maritime Provinces were told "Africa is very close to you today whether you like it or not" by the Rev. Ilya Ide, Presbyterian minister from Nigeria studying at the University of Toronto.

The conference also heard from Rev. Hamilton, Toronto, national director of Presbyterian Men; Blair Macdonald, Charlottetown, president of the Maritime Council of Presbyterian Men; George Fernie, Alex Colquhoun, president of the community, and James Laing of Hamilton, Ont.

The program on the theme "The Church Without Walls... Your Neighbour as Yourself" included Bible study, discussion groups, film strips and worship. On Sunday morning Mr. Kennedy concluded the conference by reminding the men that "The Christian message is the most dynamic message on earth if only we but understood it. It offers man forgiveness which is the fundamental need of the human heart. It assures believers of God's presence and companionship in every area of life, and it makes him more than a conqueror in every situation. These convictions the church must recapture if the Christian message is to capture the hearts and minds of men."

Ont. Swimmer May Return To Canada Wed.

LONDON (CP) — Claudia McPherson will probably return to Canada Wednesday without making a second attempt on the English Channel. The 16-year-old St. James, Man., schoolgirl was set to go Saturday morning but 30-mile-a-hour winds whipped the water into an ugly swell. "The pilot of our boat refused to take us out," said the swimmer's father, Robert McPherson, by telephone from Dover Sunday. "He said we just wouldn't have a chance."

In her first attempt Aug. 13 Claudia got within seven miles of the English shore before rough weather forced her to abandon the swim.

McPherson plans a break in the weather, and it doesn't look as if he can expect it. Claudia will go to London Tuesday and fly back to Winnipeg Wednesday," McPherson said.

Freedomites Prolong Stay At Grand Forks

GRAND FORKS, B.C. (CP) — Bridges and buildings throughout the Grand Forks area were placed under guard during the weekend as the 750 marching Sons of Freedom hunkers indicated they intended to prolong their stay here until Tuesday day at least.

The department of highways has closed all highways and bridges following the burning down of a 450-foot tower on the main highway between Grand Forks and Spokane, Wash.

An RCMP spokesman said it is a "definite possibility" in the burning of the Kettle River Bridge, 13 miles east of the Fraser Valley.

Freedomite leaders said Saturday night five members would travel by car to make advance inquiries at Agassiz, site of the special federal prison for Freedomites serving sentences for terrorism.

The group, which has covered less than 100 miles in the first week of its trek, will await the return of the five-man mission before continuing. This appointment would mean that the march will not get under way again until Tuesday or Wednesday.

The advance party is to find out whether the marchers will be able to camp near the prison, their announced destination.

Dedicated Stewardship Is Challenge to Women

A challenge to a more dedicated stewardship was given some 130 United Church women gathered over the weekend at Stanhope Beach Inn in Prince Edward Island's National Park. It was the seventh annual week-end conference to be held by the men of the Island Presbyterian. Dr. A. S. Butt, superintendent of Home Missions for Newfoundland, was the theme speaker. Harold Smith, a prominent Toronto lawyer, assisted in the week-end.

Using the theme "A Fortune To Share," Dr. Butt said a Christian has basically three things to share with his fellow-men. The first of these is his experience; the second his talents and abilities and the third his whole life, he stated.

In another address in which he recalled the story of Peter and Dr. Butt stated that when the church becomes empowered with the Holy Spirit it will convert men and women. He deplored the fact that the word, "conversion" has fallen into such misuse in the church of today and felt it was "time to take it out of its resting place and use it more often."

Mr. Smith said Christianity was not just a message to be heard, but a deed to be done. He compared the average church member to Jonah who bound his passage aboard a ship and promptly went to sleep. "What we need is men of conviction, men who are hard to stop," he declared, "just doing our duty is not enough."

Dearson's Session Plans Spark Guessing At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) — Now that the Liberal Leader Lester B. Dearson has swept away any lingering doubts that he will move a major amendment to the Throne Speech debate in the coming parliamentary session, speculation here centres on the form it may take.

Mr. Pearson has two choices. He can move a straight motion of non-confidence in the government. Or he can move one citing a list of specific complaints against the government. Form and content have little bearing on whether the motion challenging the government's Parliamentary authorities holds an amendment to the Throne Speech is a motion of non-confidence. But an amendment to the Throne is not a new motion of non-confidence.

WILL TEST STRENGTH
With Parliament opening on Thursday, Sept. 17, it is likely that Mr. Pearson's chance to move a motion of non-confidence, Oct. 1, when party leaders are expected to make their first public policy speech, is a possibility. The Liberal leader said last week in Algoma East he feels his duty to propose a motion to test the Conservative government's strength in the Commons.

The Conservatives hold 116 seats in the 252-seat Commons. Only five times in the 16 Parliaments since 1900 has there been a straight motion of non-confidence motion at the opening of Parliament immediately after a general election. All were defeated.

Usually it is felt that if a government is elected with a comfortable working majority a non-confidence motion is out of the question. This situation does not prevail this year.

OPPOSITION PROCEDURE
The classic form of non-confidence motion is an opposition procedure motion. It is used to approve a statement that the government's general advisers—its cabinet—do not possess the confidence of the country.

But in moving non-confidence motions since 1900, opposition leaders have not been so blunt. In 1911, L.B. Saks, then leader of the Liberal government, moved a motion saying there was no confidence in the Conservative cabinet of Robert Borden on naval defence policy which was not received the approval of the House.

In 1945, Conservative Opposition Leader John Bracken moved a motion declaring that the Liberal government of Mackenzie King had fallen on "free country" and was not entitled to carry out its responsibilities to the people in peace-time conditions speedily and effectively.

In 1952, George Drew, then leader of the Conservative opposition, moved a motion that

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP) — Devastating Rod Laver and solid Roy Emerson set up the all-Australian men's singles final in the last seven years Sunday and it remained for plump Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif., to keep U.S. colors flying in the U.S. tennis championships.

The brilliant, left handed Laver, shooting to duplicate Don Budge's grand slam of men's championships in 1938, gave Mexico's Rafael Osuna mercenary trainer and Concrete King, Emerson, starting slowly, dashed the hopes of key-quad Chuck McKinley of St. Ann, Mo., 4-6, 6-4, 6-3.

The 25-year-old Miss Hard, winner of the women's championship the last two years, made short work of her semifinal match with 17-year-old Virginia Palmer of Phoenix, Ariz., 6-2, 6-3 and won the enviable privilege of playing the top-seeded Margaret Smith-Love.

Miss Smith, a 5-foot-10, powerfully built Amazon from Sydney, won a thrilling dual from comebacker Maria Bueno of Brazil, the 1950 champion who is still not fully recovered from a 1961 attack of hepatitis. The score was 6-0, 6-3, 6-4.
