THE BATTLE THAT IS IMMINENT.

Plan of the Besiegers.

SANTIAGO TO BE COMPLETELY HEMMED IN.

Admiral Cervera admits that the Situation is very Critical.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, June 24.—News of a great battle on the east of Cuba, near Santiago, may be expected at any moment.

General Shafter's entire army has disembarked without a single casualty, and by this time is preparing to move towards Santiago.

It is expected that the army will reach Santiago from the south-east, while the insurgents will mass themselves on the north and north-east of the city. The city will thus be completely hemmed in. As the harbor stretches for some distance on the west and cuts off the rest of the Spanish army.

The new development of yesterday was the request of General Miley, made to the President, to be allowed to go to Santiago before taking charge of the expedition against Porto Rico. The request was granted, and the General will go on Saturday.

MADRID, June 24.—Cable despatches received here from Admiral Cervera, say that the crews of the Spanish warships at Santiago have joined the land forces in order to take part in the defence of the city.

He adds that the situation is critical, but a later despatch affirmed that the Spaniards have victoriously repulsed the enemy.

There is no doubt that until the Spanish ships are removed from the field of operations, the campaign in Santiago will be conducted against great odds. The guns of the ships command the hills over which the soldiers must go to attack the town and reach the bay.

OUR GREAT NORTHWEST.

Practical Remarks by a Practical Man.

MR. J. K. McINNIS SAYS THAT IT ONLY NEEDS MUSCLE AND MONEY.

To Develop its Great Resources.

Mr. and Mrs. J. K. McInnis, of Regina, N. W. T., are at the Queen. Mr. McInnis is editor and proprietor of "The Regina Standard," which he founded at the Territorial capital eight years ago, and which is now one of the leading, if not the very leading journals, of the West. He went away sixteen years ago, and having gone through the different stages of pioneering, is a competent authority on North West affairs. He is exceedingly sanguine about the future of that great country, and reports the farmers and ranchers making steady progress.

The country, he says, suffered much in the past from unfavorable reports sent abroad by mere adventurers who had expected to get rich without working, or having more money than experience lost it foolishly. Practical men who began with very little are accumulating wealth.

Mr. McInnis is the same unaffected, whole-souled fellow that he was when he knew him as a young politician, over twenty years ago. He was somewhat reticent, at first, when seen at his hotel yesterday, but soon warmed to his subject. "What the northwest wants," said he, "is muscle and money to develop its latent resources." He reports the professions as well represented, though good men can still find openings in the newer ones. The various mercantile lines are fully represented, especially in the older towns. "I am not here," said Mr. McInnis, "to induce anyone who is fairly satisfied with his present condition to leave this beautiful island. But if persons go west, let them, for goodness sake, go under a good name, come west and enjoy the heritage which is their birthright, and which is rapidly falling to immigrants from foreign lands."

Mr. McInnis is still an active politician, for, as he says, politics is in a large measure incidental to his calling. He contested West Assiniboa in the last Dominion election as an independent candidate nominated by the Patrons of Industry, and as an advocate of non-sectarian schools and tariff reform. The vote, as actually cast, gave Mr. McInnis a majority of four, but the bungling of returning officers and others reduced it to a tie, and Mr. Davin holds the seat by the casting vote of the Registrar. In reply to the remark "that it was rather hard luck," Mr. McInnis said: "I didn't mind it much for I had very able campaigners to contend with and never felt too sure of victory. I am glad to know that friends and opponents alike gave me credit for putting up a good fight. I won the contest and the other fellow did the work."

Being reminded that "the other fellow" also draws the indemnity, the suggestive answer was: "A thousand a year is no inducement to any Northwestern man who has a prosperous business requiring close attention. But, of course, content need be, if the responsibility had fallen upon me I would have faced it, and I imagine that I should have found occasion ere now to prove my independence."

"The Standard" is certainly an aggressive and fearless paper, which if it cannot hold the government to their platform promises, will certainly keep them well reminded of them.

Mrs. McInnis is a daughter of the late Mr. Thomas Carr, of Rustico. They intend remaining here some weeks and will visit friends and relatives in different parts of the province.
