Belyea Wins Third Place in Big Race
PHILADELPHIA, June 5—Walter Hoover captured the world's amateur single scull championship and the Philadelphia gold challenge cup by defeating the cream of the oarsmen from two nations this afternoon on the Schuylkill river. The Duluth entry covered the mile and a quarter course in seven minutes, twenty-four seconds, finishing a length and a half ahead of Paul Costello, of Vesper, who placed second. Hilton Belyea, the St. John hope, crossed the line two feet back of Costello, while Garrett Gilmere, of the Bachelors Club, trailed the Canadian by two lengths.

Hoover's victory came as a result of a sensational spurt in the last quarter of a mile, which Costello and Belyea tried in vain to match. The time, while not a world's record, is the fastest ever made in official competition on the Schuylkill. The scullers were aided by a strong current and a smooth stretch of water, although a fairly stiff wind swept up the course during the competition.

More than 10,000 spectators viewed the race.

Philadelphia, June 5—Hilton Belyea, of St. John, N.B., Canadian sculling champion, will not enter the contest for the Diamond scull at Henley, England. He announced this to the Canadian Press following his defeat by Walter M. Hoover, the United States champion, in the race for the Philadelphia gold challenge cup here this morning.

Belyea said he was contemplating retiring from rowing competition. The Canadian champion's time was seven minutes and thirty seconds. While Hoover finished far in

the lead, his time being 7:24. Belyea was only two-fifths of a second behind Paul Costello of Philadelphia, and the struggle between the local rower and the Canadian for second honors was one of the most thrilling features of the race.

Neibergall Swats Three Home Runs
NEW YORK, June 5—There were no American League games scheduled for today, and only two National games. That between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia at the latter city had to be postponed on account of rain. It also interfered with the International League double-header which was to be played at Baltimore, w. c. Rading. The first game was called at the end of the third inning.

Catcher Charles Neibergall of Syracuse equalled a modern International League record today when he made three home runs in the game at Syracuse against Toronto, the last, proceut off Thompson in the ninth with two out and the score tied winning for the Stars, 8 to 7.

sons are almost impossible. To be exact, it is 515 degrees Fahrenheit below zero. For instance the known temperature near the North Pole varies from 30 to 60 degrees below zero. At the highest altitude ever reached in an airplane the temperature hovered around 60 degrees below zero. This was nearly seven miles up. This remarkable spot is in Washington. It is the cryogenic laboratory of the Bureau of Mines Department of Interior, where for more than two years, scientists have been working in an effort to liquefy helium gas purify it and make it 100 percent efficient in the life of giant dirigibles. And after numerous failures, success finally in sight, so sure are the scientists that they expect to be able

to announce before the end of the year that what has been assumed to be impossible has been accomplished and that helium gas has been liquefied and absolutely isolated from traces of any foreign gases. When the process is perfected, it will be of inestimable value to science particularly to the navigation of the air by the huge ships which will cross the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. It will make accidents, such as that recently happened the airship Roma impossible, for the gas is non-inflammable and only lacks lifting power to the extent that it has been impossible to free it of other gases. The research work is also calculated to reduce the cost of producing helium, which to date has been so extensive and prohibitive

that airships have been only partially filled with it.
