

Effect Locally Of Military Changes

The sweeping changes in the Reserve Army announced from Ottawa yesterday will probably have a tendency to cause a reduction in the number of high ranking officers here. There is a possibility that one or two commanding officers will revert to their former rank of major if they remain in the service.

It is not expected that there will be any reduction in the number of men although the 28th Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment will lose its identity and become a part of the present Prince Edward Island Regiment, formerly known as the 17th Recon Regiment.

Although full details are not available as yet it is believed that the P.E.I. Regiment may become a tank unit instead of its present status as an armoured corps. The amalgamation of the two principal units here is expected to be the only major change as both 5 Signals Regiment and the present Medical Corps will retain their status, though probably under new names.

Officers of the P.E.I. Regiment are inclined to believe that the change will give a great boost, especially to those now in the two units involved. It is felt that amalgamation will mean greater interest in the service.

This week the P.E.I. Regiment, now in summer camp at Utopia, N.B., led all units as the best regiment on parade. The local boys won on three of the five days on which they were judged. In the matter of sports they also took the annual camp tug of war.

With the union with the present 18th L. A. Regiment the P. E. I. Regiment will be the largest regiment on Prince Edward Island, and will take in components from all three counties.

To Address

In his first attempt in politics Mr. Martin unsuccessfully contested an Ontario by-election in the riding of Renfrew North in 1928. In his second attempt, seven years later, in 1935, he was elected to the House of Commons for the federal riding of Essex East in Western Ontario, which riding he has represented continuously since that time. In 1943 he became Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Labour, and on April 18, 1946 he assumed his first Cabinet post as Secretary of State. During his tenure of office he piloted the Canadian Citizenship Act through Parliament.

On December 17, 1946, a little over a year after he first entered the Cabinet, Mr. Martin was appointed to his present Cabinet post of Minister of National Health and Welfare. Two notable events in the Department's history since he took office have been the inauguration of the National Health Program in 1948 and the development of the federal Old Age Security Program in 1951. Early in 1951 the federal responsibility for Civil Defence was transferred to his department.

In 1936 Mr. Martin married Eleanor Adams of Windsor. They have one son, Paul, and one daughter, Mary Ann. CALEDONIAN CLUB PREPARING FOR 92nd ANNUAL SCOTTISH GATHERING

The annual Gathering of the Clans being held in Charlottetown August 4 this year will mark the 92nd consecutive year that the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island has sponsored Highland dancing, piping and Highland games in the Province. The first public Gathering of the Clans was held on the Barrack Square in Charlottetown in 1863.

Adhering to the custom established in the Highlands, the Caledonian Club usually holds its Gatherings each year in different parts of the Province. In recent years the Games provided top Highland entertainment in such places as Caledonia, New Perth, Kinross, Strathgartney and Montague. The success of the games each year is attested to by the fact that the Club was always invited to return the next year. In each instance this was done both to the satisfaction of the people in the community and the Caledonian Club. Due to popular demand the event will be held this summer at the Exhibition Grounds in Charlottetown where there are facilities for accommodating a larger number of people. By staging the Clans Gathering in Charlottetown this year it would be possible to hold the Games in the city again in 1955 to tie in with the Centennial Year program.

During the past few years, Prince Edward Island has produced an increasing number of Highland dancers who are now able to compete with the best in the Maritimes. A large number of dancers and pipers from other parts of the Maritimes competed at Montague last year and in previous years. It is expected that these dancers will come again to Charlottetown to part in this year's Gathering.

SYDNEY, Australia, (CP) - The Australian wool season closed with an official production estimate of 1,344,000,000 pounds, about three per cent below last season's record output. Brokers said the current season had been notable for price stability.

City Centennial Committee Meets

Progress reports from committee chairmen to the general committee of the Charlottetown Centennial celebration were submitted at a well attended meeting in City Hall yesterday afternoon under the chairmanship of Col. F. J. Storey. The reports indicated progress in consolidating many of the ideas being placed before the general committee for full publicity at an early date.

Four applications were received for the position of permanent secretary of the committee, but no decision was reached pending further investigation into the qualifications of the applicants. Committeemen reporting included Mr. Justice Tweedy, Messrs. Earl Taylor, Ferrell Gaudet and Councillor Walthen Gaudet. Mayor J. D. Stewart and the chairmen also reported on several matters receiving their personal attention dealing with the celebration.

Three Women Do Well Selling Cars in Toronto

TORONTO (CP) - One of the last male strongholds collapsed recently when three women were discovered selling cars in Toronto. Mrs. Ruth Sanderson and Mrs. Roberta Ferguson of Austin of England have been in the business for several years. Mrs. Sanderson, pioneer car saleswoman in Canada who started by accident. She was driving her new English car one day when a woman stopped her and asked for the "real low-down on these cars - I don't trust the salesman."

She got a demonstration and Mrs. Sanderson got an idea. Mrs. Sanderson approached Austin for a job as saleswoman in 1949 and they were enthusiastic. Mrs. Ferguson was taken on a couple of years later.

LOVES CARS

Third saleswoman in the group is newcomer Ruth Phillipson, a tall red-headed English girl. She began with a Toronto English car dealer last spring and now is in sales in Hamilton. "I love cars and I love people," she said. "I know I could sell one to the other."

Most buyers are men but they don't seem to mind buying a car from a woman Ruth said. "In fact they seem to have more confidence in a woman and are more ready to believe she is telling the truth."

Selling cars to women is another matter. Men want to know about the motor, city driving, cost of operation Ruth said. Women are more concerned with color scheme appearance, comfort and how easily they can be handled.

DOWN PAYMENT AS GIFT

Ruth has something new in the gift-giving field. She said it is surprising how many men put a down payment on a small car for their wives instead of giving them a watch or fur coat. Ruth has been car-crazy since wartime in her native Manchester, England. She took six hours of driving lessons then joined the WRNs as a driver. For two and a half years she drove cars and ambulances through the blackout without mishap. Her record still stands.

Red Cross headquarters at Brighton Beach is the daily scene of great activity when more than 400 children faithfully attend their classes in swimming and water safety under competent instructors. The afternoon period is devoted to play on the grounds nearby provided in connection with the pool. Activities continued until 8 o'clock each evening in order to give any children accompanied by parents an opportunity to use the pool.

A feature of the present activities is the training in swimming and water safety which has been entered into by a class of 75 nurses recruited from the city hospitals, as a result of a new movement on the part of the Red Cross.

Crop Report From Western Canada

WINNIPEG, Man., July 9 - Showers were prevalent throughout the West during the past week, delaying summer fallowing and weed spraying. Isolated reports of seeding are noted but those are only green feed crops, and seeders generally have been put away for the current year. Many districts report crops two to three weeks later than normal and while considerable early-burn grain are in the shot blade, little heading is observed at this date, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

Excessive moisture has given a yellowish tinge to crops in some districts, otherwise they appear healthy and require only warm weather to develop into average or above-average yields on actual seed acreage. Severe local storms with hail damaged crops at Glenboro in Manitoba and east and South of Regina in Saskatchewan in some cases barns were flattened, trees uprooted and basements flooded, with two to six inches of rain covering an extensive area. In the Peace River warm dry weather with only an occasional shower has made growth conditions ideal. Some wheat is in shot blade and a normal or better crop is generally in prospect. Weather during the past week with some rain. In tree fruits, cherries will start moving in less-than-car-load-lot quantities around July 21st. All fruit is developing nicely and no damage from any source is reported. There is no change in the estimates previously given.

Mr. Driscoll's nomination was moved by Winston Wood, Mt. Herbert and seconded by Eimer Macdonald, Bedford.

The nomination of Major MacEas was moved by Wylie Gibson of Marshfield and seconded by J. B. McDonald, Glenfinnan.

Both candidates addressed the meeting, expressing thanks for the confidence placed in them. Mr. Wylie Gibson, reporting for the resolutions committee, moved resolutions expressing support of and confidence in the Federal and Provincial leaders, Mr. George Drew and Mr. R. Bell as well as the Federal member, Mr. J. Angus MacLean.

Engineer And Fireman Killed In Derailment

WETASKIWIN, Alta. (CP) - An engineer and fireman were killed early Friday when the locomotive and four baggage cars of the Canadian Pacific Railway's No. 83 eastbound passenger train plunged from the track into a ditch about four miles east of here.

Killed were engineer Giles Macdonald, 58, and fireman Michael Mackowichuk, 41, both of Edmonton. Macdonald was a brother of Mr. Justice Hugh John Macdonald of the Alberta Supreme Court.

CP officials said no passengers on the seven-car Edmonton-Winnipeg train were injured. The derailment occurred on a single track in a "slow zone." The engine and three head-end cars of mail, baggage and express crashed on their sides. Two of the three passenger cars also left the track but remained upright.

Passengers were taken to Wetaskiwin and then returned to Edmonton.

Wetaskiwin is about 40 miles south of Edmonton.
