Miss Frances Montgomery, Ass't Director of the Maritime School of Social Work, Halifax, was welcomed to the meeting.

Reports of the various standing committees were given and plans were made for the Annual meeting to be held in St. John during May.

Mr. Stan Matheson, Social Worker with the Provincial Hospital, Fairville, led a discussion on topics that will be taken up at the International Conference on Social Work to be held in Madras, India, December 14-20, 1952. It will be the sixth International Conference on Social Work, the theme being, "The Role of Social Service in Raising the Standard of Living."
