DROWNED.—Capt. Hobbs, of the tug Frank C. Butt, which arrived from Pugwash on Thursday evening, reports that two young men named Black and Stewart were drowned while fishing oysters in the river above the bridge at Pugwash on Thursday morning. One of the bodies was recovered.

THE HUDSON'S BAY EXPEDITION.—The steamer Neptune, with her corps of observers for the Government expedition to Hudson's Bay, sailed last evening. Her departure from the Marine and Fisheries wharf, about half past three, was witnessed by quite a number of people, and after taking a turn up Bedford Basin, the steamer proceeded down the harbor, those on board waving their farewells from the bow and stern. The members of the expedition, during the afternoon, had a couple of hours' entertainment at the Atlantic Hotel, Upper Water Street, several toasts and brief addresses being indulged in, after which they embarked on the Neptune. The latter displayed the Canadian blue ensign at her peak.—Halifax Chronicle 23rd.

THE bank statement for June shows the following aggregate changes as compared with last month: In capital there is a decrease of \$364,000, which is all in the Maritime Bank, New Brunswick, the same decrease in capital paid up being shown in the same bank, while increases in capital paid up are shown in Standard Bank, \$799; Bank of Hamilton, \$15,000; Western Bank, \$50; Central Bank, \$12,400; Bank of Hochelaga, \$1,519; Merchants', \$900. In reserved fund there are increases in Commerce of \$100,000; Standard, \$45,000; Imperial, \$30,000; and Maritime Bank, \$40,000; Banque Nationale shows decrease of \$30,000. The total liabilities for June are \$140,973,233.00, being an increase of \$4,754,435.05 over May. Total assets for June, \$223,855,601, being an increase of \$4,883,510.18 over May.

The Great Boat Race.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., July 24. There was a large gathering of people on both banks of the river to-day to witness the race. In the final heat Conley, Gaudaur, Hamm, Lee, Ten Eyck and Teemer started. Teemer was the favorite of the betting men from the start. At the half mile post, Teemer leading, Ten Eyck second, Gaudaur third, Hamm fourth, Lee fifth, Conley rowed down to the turn hugging the Canadian shore, and was so far apart from the others that it was hard to say just what position he occupied. Lee stopped rowing when he had gone a mile, at which distance Teemer led. After turning the buoy, Conley still kept the Canadian shore. At that time he was about eight lengths ahead. Teemer put on a spurt, but did not seem to lessen the gap. The line was crossed, with Conley leading Teemer fully four lengths, Gaudaur was third, and Hamm next; Ten Eyck was far in the rear. The result was a great surprise, as it was thought Teemer was almost sure to win. Teemer has claimed that Conley would not let him pass him, taking his water, and has entered a protest against Conley being awarded place in the Consolation race which was contested by Hosmer, Lee, Hamm, McCormack, Riley and Ten Eyck. Ten Eyck came in first, Lee second, Hamm third, Hosmer fourth, McCormack fifth, and Riley out of the race, he having upset his boat.

The Franco-Chinese Difficulty.

LONDON, July 25. A Paris despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company states that orders have been telegraphed to the French officers in command in China, not to grant China any further delay, but to occupy Fochow at once, if the demands of France are not satisfied.

A Terrible Explosion.

WILKES BARRE, Pa., July 25. The boiler of the shifting engine on the Lehigh Valley railroad, with a crew of five men on board, exploded this morning with great force, and the entire crew were killed.

A Royal Visitor.

LONDON, July 25. King Oscar of Sweden is visiting London, incognito.

SEASIDE, July 25. The rebels maintained a heavy fire upon the city last night. Two Egyptian soldiers were wounded.

Cholera Decreasing.

PARIS, July 24. Nearly all the tradespeople have left Arles on account of the rapid spread of cholera. It is officially announced that the cholera epidemic at Marseilles and Toulon is decreasing. The health of Paris is good.

CURRENT NOTES.

The Illinois coal miners' strike has ended in a failure.

Depression is reported in the New England rubber trade.

Two deaths from Asiatic cholera have occurred at Madrid.

Further discoveries of nihilist plots have been made at Moscow.

The worms are destroying the tamarac trees in the Quebec district.

Petitions are in circulation for the submission of the Scott Act in Winnipeg.

A statute to Beehoven, the composer, was unveiled in New York a few days ago.

Intense excitement continues in Quebec respecting the quarantining of passenger steamships.

The temperance people express confidence of being able to carry the Scott Act in Carleton, Ont.

It is estimated that over 100,000 men took part in the franchise bill demonstration at London.

The Czar is to visit Warsaw in August, and great preparations are being made to secure his safety.

The Queen has sent her congratulations to President Arthur on the return of the Greely explorers.

Eleven students have been arrested at St. Petersburg for alleged conspiracy in a plot against the Czar.

The Nihilists blew up a powder mill in Warsaw, Monday. Two soldiers were killed and many wounded.

The prospects for the indigo crop in Bengal and the tea crop in Assam are unfavorable. Rain is badly wanted.

"An attempt to legislate by picnic" is what Lord Salisbury calls the Franchise Bill demonstration at London.

Reports from stations on all the South-Western railroads of the United States show that the outlook for crops was never better.

The French government have revoked the order for the usual military manoeuvres in the south on account of the cholera outbreak.

A camel will work for seven or eight days without drinking. In this he differs from some men who will drink seven or eight days without working.

It is expected that an agreement will shortly be reached between Prussia and the Vatican in regard to the appointment of a new archbishop of Posen.

A merchant has arrived at Assonan and reports that some of Hicks Pasha's men are yet alive in the hills near Kordofan, and that Gordon is safe in Khartoum.

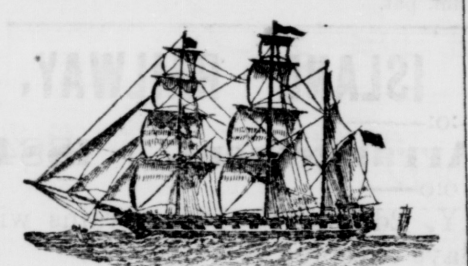
The negotiations between France and Morocco for the rectification of the frontier have been suspended until an arrangement can be completed with objecting powers.

His Excellency the Governor General and Lady Lansdowne will return from the Caspacia fishing grounds early in August, and resume their quarters at the Citadel, Quebec, for a few weeks.
