

RCAF In Second Place With Win Over Juniors

The R. C. A. F. Royals on the strength of a bases loaded home run by Gaudet and effective relief pitching by Taylor took over undisputed possession of second place in the Island Baseball League last night by outscoring the Junior Abbies 11-8 in a game played under the lights at Memorial Field.

The win was the fifth in League play for the airmen this season and gives them a total of ten points, two more than third place M. C. A. and C. & B. teams.

The versatile Gaudet, a superb outfielder and a good pitcher, brought the airmen from behind in the fifth inning as he lined a Johnny Squarebriggs pitch into centerfield for a bases loaded homer.

Bury Hood of the Abbies came up with a nice pick off MacKenzie in the ninth inning to throw the Air Force runner out at first.

The Junior Abbies showed last night that they are accumulating a lot of inside baseball knowledge from coach Randy Edwards but that it is going to take some time for them to get their defense and batting working in coordination. They committed eight miscues in their game with the Air Force but to offset these damaging factors they showed some good positional play along with a number of new plays as well as an improvement in their batting.

Randy apparently has been teaching the boys how to hunt for they laid several good ones against Air Force pitcher MacKinnon. The pitchers in particular looked adept at this phase of the game as Johnny Squarebriggs laid down two perfect sacrifice hits and Benny Carson came through with another. Cliff Ready also showed that he is on his way out of the batting slump that has plagued him throughout the year as he connected for two hits and would have had a third only for a great stop by Petty, the Air Force first sacker.

Rosa Burns, who coached the Air Force team for the past two years, has left the Summerside base and will be heading towards Europe in about a month's time. The airmen last night were handled by Gunner Cox, who regularly plays centre field. The Gunner, a valuable man in the outer gardens and at the plate, watched the game from the sidelines and piloted the team to the win in his first start as a coach at Charlottetown.

In his place Cox had a fellow who looks like a pretty fair ball player. This Gaudet has proved himself in every position he has played with the Air Force team on Memorial Field. The first time he showed here he came up with a spectacular outfield catch against the Intermediate Abbies. The next time he gave a good pitching performance in stopping M.C.A. by a 12-3 score and last night he looked fairly potent at the plate as he came through with a single and homer to drive four runs across the plate.

There's going to be plenty of baseball in Victoria Park for the Little Leaguers and older boys from next week on. It has been learned from Randy Edwards, Officials are busy leveling off two diamonds on the Hospital Field and these diamonds may be ready for play, complete with backstops and markings, before the week-end. In addition to the Little Leaguers there will be baseball for boys from 13 years and older. The biggest problem confronting the baseball officials is to get men and older boys to work with the teams.

The addition of the Summerside Air Force to the City Softball League should prove quite a boost to softball in the City. There's not much doubt but that the airmen will field a top notch team headed by their special ball pitching artist, Ross Armstrong. Ross has been a standout with the Air Force teams in the past and this season has starred with the Jerps in the Summerside League.

It is understood that the formation of an Air Force team will force the Jerps to disband. At least five of the players on the Jerps are members of the R. C. A. F. and will be playing for the Summerside entry in the City League. It is possible that three of the remaining players may line up with the Charlottetown Branch of the Legion in the same league. The Legion have been given permission to add three players to their roster and they might be getting pitcher Charlie Ballam, catcher Laysh Schurman and third baseman Earl Smith. If they do they will be a force to be reckoned with before the League schedule has run its course.

Chicago White Sox Whip N.Y. Yankees 4-2 For Champs' 4th Loss In Row

(By The Canadian Press) The amazing Chicago White Sox Thursday exploded the invincibility myth of New York Yankees for the third straight day, whipping the world champions 4-2 and cutting their American League lead to nine games.

The Sox scored twice on two singles, a sacrifice and an error in the ninth to hand the Yanks their fourth loss in a row. Minnie Minoso singled home the tie-breaking run to extend his hitting streak to 17 games.

Larry Doby and Al Rosen drove in five runs apiece as the second place Cleveland Indians swamped Boston 15-4. Doby homered twice, doubled and singled. Rosen hit a home run in the eighth-run ninth inning and also doubled and singled.

The Philadelphia Phils won their 11th straight this season over Chicago Cubs, 13-2, and edged into third place, six percentage points ahead of St. Louis Cardinals who lost 9-4 to New York Giants.

The Phils battered four Chicago pitchers for 19 hits with bonus rookie Ted Kazanski, making his debut at shortstop, getting two doubles and a single.

The Giants walked away from the Cards with a seven-run seventh inning featuring a grand slam homer by pinch hitter Bobby Hofman.

In the only two night games, both in the American League, St. Louis Browns swept a three-game series from Washington by beating the Senators 3-1 and Philadelphia Athletics salvaged the third and final game of their series against Detroit Tigers with a 5-2 win.

The Browns' win was their fourth straight. Lethander Harry Brecheen posted the victory but he needed help from Satchel Paige in the seventh inning.

Harry Byrd got credit for the A's win as he scattered nine hits. He had shutout until the ninth inning when the Tigers counted their two runs.

Durrelle Gains 10-Round Decision

MONCTON, N.S. (CP)—Yvon Durrelle, Canadian middleweight champion from Baie St. Anne, N.B., gained a 10-round decision over Curtis Wade, of Baltimore, in an exhibition bout here Thursday night. The 22-year-old champion weighed 161 and Wade, 159, topped the scales at 159.

After a slow start, Durrelle caught up with Wade in the last few rounds and the judges returned an unpopular verdict in his favor. Wade's manager, Dave Silverman, claimed the point system was faulty and said he would protest the decision.

Referee Bill Landry and judge Al Boach voted for Durrelle while judge Bill Uhren favored Wade.

Manager Casey Stengel Gives Yankees Blast

NEW YORK, (AP)—Manager Casey Stengel, irked at the recent poor showing of his New York Yankees, gave angry notice to his players Thursday that they'd better wake up, or else.

Plainly upset by the Yankees' three straight defeats, the last two by Chicago White Sox, a week after their 18-game winning streak, Stengel lectured his American League athletes before their third and final game of the current series with the White Sox.

It marked the first time Stengel had rebuked his players since last September.

"Two games with the Sox have humiliated us, and I believe there is something radically wrong. I may have to move some of them. Mickey Mantle has hit a couple of homers since we got back but, in general, his work has been disappointing."

Stengel made it clear that other Yankees were as much to blame as his youthful star.

"The hitters aren't hitting, the pitchers aren't pitching and the fielders aren't fielding," Stengel complained.

Canadian Girl Wins British Women's Open Amateur Golf Ch'ship

PORHCRAWL, Wales (CP)—A 19-year-old golfing miss from Fonthill, Ont., freckle-faced Marlene Stewart, won the British women's open amateur golf title Thursday, the first Canadian to take the tournament in its 60-year history.

After it was all over, the cool little shotmaker, they call her "Little Ben" after the great Ben Hogan, could hardly believe it herself.

She admitted that it was "one of the greatest thrills of my life" to defeat the more-experienced, 26-year-old Irish champion, Philomena Garvey, 7 and 6 in the 36-hole final over the Royal Porthcawl links. They were all square after the first six holes but Marlene was never headed after that.

"I don't think I have yet fully realized I have won," said the little five-foot golfing sensation who started the Canadian scene in 1950 by becoming the youngest golfer ever to take the women's closed and open amateur tournaments in a single year.

Marlene has been the talk of these ancient links since she got to the finals Wednesday with victories over Scotland's Jean Donald, one up, and England's highly-rated Elizabeth Price, 6 and 4.

Name Captain of Davis Cup Team

MONTREAL, (CP)—Georges LeClerc has been named non-playing captain of Canada's Davis Cup team for the second consecutive year.

The announcement was made Thursday by Lt.-Col. James McAvilly, president of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association. Members of the team have not yet been selected.

Dr. LeClerc is a native of Ottawa and he learned his tennis at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club there. Since 1933 he has been an active member of the Mount Royal Club in Montreal.

In his 40's, he is still an active player and has probably played more sets of tennis than anyone in Canada. Dr. LeClerc began keeping close records of the games he has played, both in tournament and in social competition, since 1928. He has completed 13,021 sets.

Primarily a doubles player, he teamed up with Mrs. H. L. Berry to win the Canadian mixed doubles championship in 1934.
