

Island Horses Win At Truro Raceway

TRURO, (CP)—Four Prince Edward Island horses were winners Wednesday night in the eight race card at the Truro raceway. Keppock Playgirl, owned by H. B. Willis of Kingston, P. E. I., was the only double winner taking the fifth and eighth races.

Propane owned by the Small and Arnett at a 1 1/2 mile in Summerside teamed with Eddie Hoosier, owned by Sam Walker of Lower Sackville, N. S., to pay \$373.60 in the daily double.

Other Island winners were: Amber the Great, owned by James Heffell of Summerside, and Joey Harvester, W. MacNeil of Southport.

Money's Worth owned by Charles Nelson, Truro and Miss Bluenose, H. Spence, Bridgewater, N. S., were the other event winners.

New Decline In TB Death Rate

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian tuberculosis association announced Tuesday that fewer persons died of tuberculosis in Canada in 1953 than at any time in history.

Dr. G. J. Wherrett, executive secretary of the association, said in a statement tuberculosis killed 1,810 persons last year, representing a death rate of 12.3 per 100,000 of population. This was a drop of 25 per cent from the 1952 total of 2,457 and a rate of 17.1, both of which also were record lows.

"However," he said, "while rejoicing at this remarkable decline in tuberculosis mortality, we should not lose sight of the fact that here were 10,545 new cases of tuberculosis discovered in Canada in 1953. We still have not beaten the disease although we have reduced its killing potential."

The tuberculosis death rate declined in all provinces in 1953. Ontario continued to lead the provinces with the lowest death rate—5.4 per 100,000 of population. Nova Scotia was fourth with 10.9; Prince Edward Island seventh with 12.3; New Brunswick eighth with 12.9; Quebec ninth with 19.8 and Newfoundland 10th with 29.

Soldier Sentenced And Firm Fined In Army Swindle

CALGARY, (CP)—A soldier has been sentenced to a four-month jail term and a Calgary cartage firm fined \$200 in an army moving swindle similar to those which recently brought scandal to military establishments in eastern Canada.

The soldier, Cpl. Alfred Good, was sentenced when he pleaded guilty to a false pretences charge in police court Tuesday and the moving firm, Reliance Storage and Cartage Company, was fined Wednesday when a guilty plea was registered on its behalf.
