NOT FOUR YEARS.—Dr. Cummings, the Annsboro-Halifax abortionist, has been sentenced to four years in Dorchester penitentiary. In giving his judgment Judge Johnson said the law justified the court in sentencing the prisoner for life, but the judge took into consideration the prisoner's age, and the fact of his coming from a country where the crime is not looked upon with such abhorrence as it is here. "Dr." Cummings was brought to Dorchester on Wednesday in charge of jailer Chambers of Halifax.

FOOTBALL.

A Well-Contested Game.

HALIFAX, Nov. 7. There was a great game of football here to-day between the Abegweits of Charlottetown and the Dalhousie College team. The ball was kept most of the time in the Abegweits' territory, but occasionally it neared the other side. For the last ten minutes of the second half the battle raged within five feet of the Abegweits' goal line, and over again it looked as though the College would secure a try, but it never came. When time was called, neither side had scored. The visitors were compelled to rouse three times for safety, which gives the honor to Dalhousie. The Wanderers having been defeated by the Abegweits yesterday, the Dalhousians, who have very little love for the former club, consider to-day's work a victory for themselves over the Wanderers. Dalhousie entertained the visitors at dinner at the Queen hotel to-night. They return home to-morrow.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. The Executive have declined to interfere in the Birchall case. The Minister of Justice has addressed a circular to the Attorney Generals of the Provinces and Judges charged with judicial functions in criminal matters in which he says: "The question of the expediency of abolishing the functions of grand juries in relation to the administration of criminal justice has on several occasions been brought to the attention of Parliament, and intimations have from time to time been made to the Government by municipal bodies, judges and others interested in criminal jurisprudence that the abolition would be in the public interests. It is my intention to lay before Parliament in the near future a bill codifying the Crimes law of Canada, both as regards substantive law and procedure. Before submitting it, however, I would be very glad to be favored with your views upon the question above mentioned. The Department of Marine announces that the lighthouse on the eastern end of Pages Island at the entrance to the harbor of Port la tour will be put in operation on the 15th November.

A Storm Prevailing.

LONDON, Nov. 7. A heavy storm prevails throughout Great Britain and Ireland, and much damage has been done. Rain is falling incessantly, and many districts in the country have been flooded. A high wind is blowing, and many wrecks at sea are reported. A despatch from Belfast states that the yacht Franca has been lost there, and the owner, Viscount Candillupe, eldest son and heir of Earl De La Warr, was drowned.

BANGOR, Nov. 7. Mrs. A. A. Nickerson, of this city, while shooting on the Pasham Pond with her husband this afternoon, was instantly killed by the accidental discharge of her rifle.
