# Small Ship Sails Monday On Voyage To Antarctic

LONDON (Reuters)—A small ship will sail from here Monday carrying 17 explorers on the first stage of a bid to open up the vast, unexplored Antarctic continent where great wealth may lie buried.

They will face many months of hardship, loneliness and danger, living in shacks in temperatures as much as 120 degrees below freezing.

But the prizes may be tremendous—important new air routes over the base of the world, scientific discoveries, perhaps treasures of uranium, gold and other precious minerals.

The enterprise, officially known as the Commonwealth trans-Antarctic expedition of 1955-58, is the most ambitious and scientifically planned attempt yet made to explore the south polar continent.

It will cost nearly \$500,000 and cover 2,000 miles of the continent, Britain regards it as her major effort for the international geophysical year of 1957-58.

Dr. Vivian Fuchs, 45-year-old explorer and scholar leading the expedition, will sail with the advance party on Monday aboard the expedition's ship, an 82-ton Canadian seal-catching vessel named the Theron.

Hillary will join the Theron at Montevideo, Uruguay, and stay with the advance party for a short time to pick up experience of Antarctic conditions and the problems of base building.
