SUPREME COURT.—The court met this forenoon, pursuant to adjournment, the three judges being present. In the case of Mary McLeod vs. Kenneth McKenzie and Donald McLeod, an action of trespass and assault tried Trinity Term, 1890, when a verdict was entered for the plaintiff, the Chief Justice gave judgment discharging the rule nisi for new trial.
