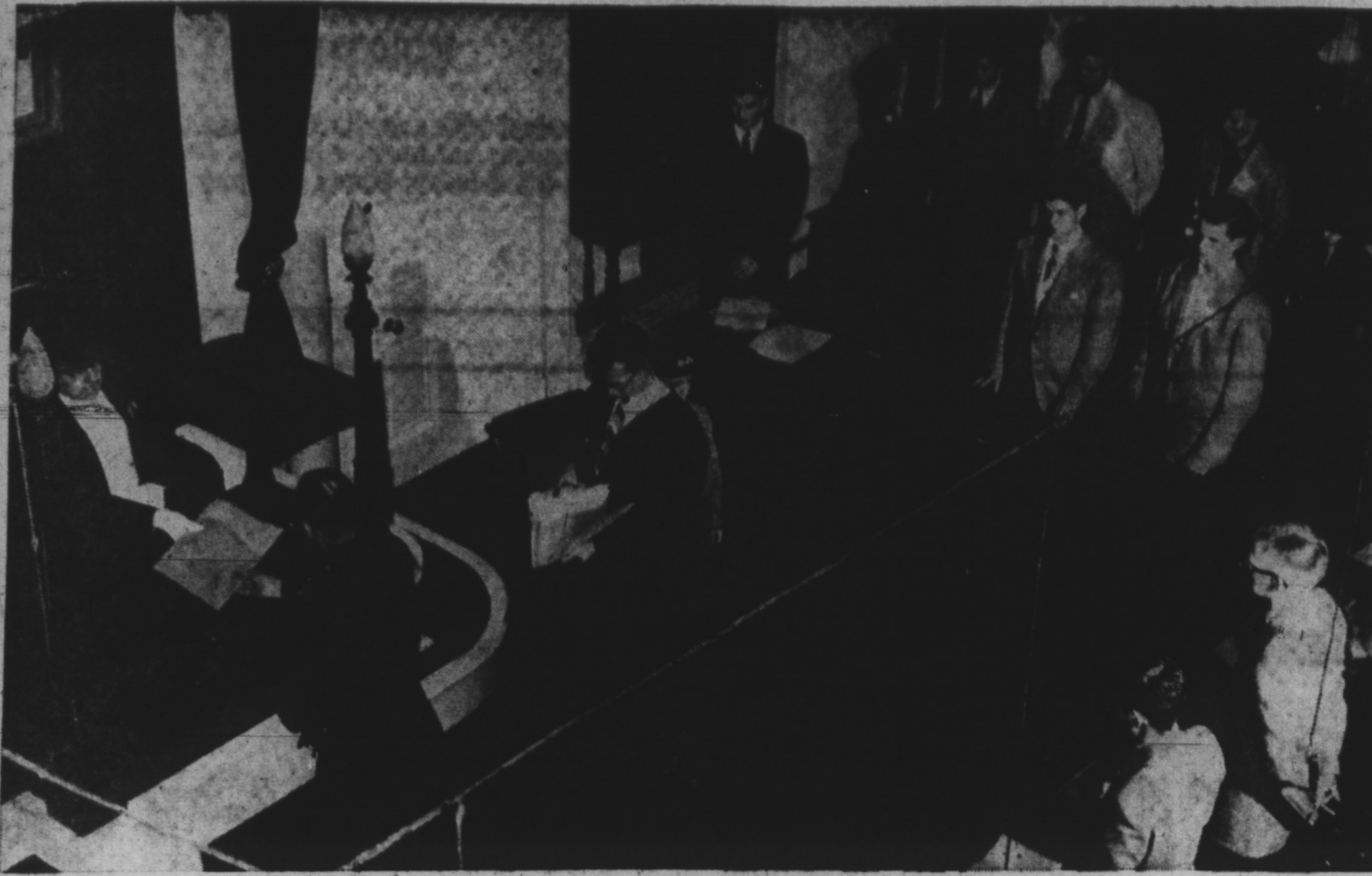

Junior Farmers Urged To Take 'Active Role'

It was very important that young people "take an active part in the political organization of their choice," Minister of Agriculture Eugene Cullen said last night. He was speaking at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Junior Farmers Federation, held at Birch Court, Charlottetown. Mr. Cullen said that because consolidation is increasing in the agricultural field, it is important for junior farmers to keep informed in this matter. It was also important for them to make known their thoughts towards the implementation of changes that are taking place. In the absence of the president and secretary, Sterling MacRae was named chairman for the meeting and Urban Laughlin secretary. Other speakers included Deputy Minister of Agriculture S. C. Wright and Miss Audrey MacMillan. Mr. Wright congratulated the organization on its achievements over the year while Miss MacMillan urged the Junior Farmers Federation to try and organize new groups. Also at the meeting were David Peacock, Dr. George C. Fisher, Allan Palmer, D. Ward and George MacNeill, all from the Department of Agriculture. A trophy, presented to the group completing the largest number of projects for 1958, was won by the New Glasgow and district Junior Farmers. Their two major projects were erection of the recreation centre and the purchase of a fire truck. The meeting appointed Elbert Orr of New Glasgow liaison officer to the Provincial Drama Association. A meeting of the directors and the nominating committee will be held next Friday at the Department of Agriculture offices, Charlottetown to elect new officers. Among resolutions passed last night was one expressing thanks to the Experimental Farm for providing facilities for the meeting.

(Continued from page 1) scattered words indicating the ship was going down at the time of the last transmission. The Greenland command said, however, it thought the message could have been misunderstood because of heavy garbling. The Hedtoft was equipped with more than the usual number of watertight compartments for the Arctic run. There was a chance they would keep her afloat longer than normally might be expected. The "scene of the battle against the savage northern sea was just off the storm-enshrouded south-west tip of Greenland. The first distress signal from the Hedtoft crackled over the air at 11:54 a.m. It gave her position as 37 miles off Greenland and 600 miles below the Arctic Circle. Then the message added tersely: "Collision with an iceberg." UNCANNY PARALLEL That meant the little vessel had smashed into an ice mass about 1,300 miles from the North Atlantic graveyard of the Titanic in an uncanny parallel to one of the sea's great disasters. The Titanic was on her maiden voyage in 1912 when she struck an iceberg south of Newfoundland and went down with the loss of more than 1,500 passengers and crew. Shortly after the Hedtoft flashed her first SOS she reported she was "filling fast." Later she added to the urgency of her plight with the words: "Taking a lot of water in engine room... need immediate assistance."

Efforts To Locate Bidder For Killarney Are Fruitless

Efforts to locate a Charlottetown man reported to have offered to buy Killarney from its American owner were fruitless in Charlottetown Friday. A Dublin report Thursday said an Irish-Canadian whose name was given as L. Kelly of Charlottetown, wrote the Killarney council asking it to pass his offer to the estate's owner, real estate broker J. Stuart Robertson of Boca Raton, Fla. "But all the known Kellys in Charlottetown denied knowledge of the matter. The letter writer told the Killarney council he would be prepared to pay \$200,000 or more for the 8,500-acre estate. Robertson paid a reported \$224,000 for it in 1956.

Highway Power Lines Are Now Being Removed

SUMMERSIDE — Overhead power lines on the western highway which cross the approach section to the new runways at RCAF Station are being removed as part of the expansion program at the air base. Maritime Electric Company has already completed its part of the work and the town of Summerside and the Island Telephone Company will install underground cables to bypass the approach area when their lines have been taken down. The firm of Curran and Briggs is expected to complete the installation of the high power cable for the town within a week, replacing the lines now carried by Maritime Electric Company poles. When these go underground Maritime Electric will transfer its lines to new division poles and the poles across the approach will be removed. The department of national defence is paying the cost of removing the wires.

Gov't Asks Parliament For Money

OTTAWA (CP) — The government Friday asked Parliament to approve of \$27,954,667 in further supplementary estimates of expenditures, bringing its total estimated budgetary spending for the current fiscal year to an all time high of \$5,324,070,310. Total spending proposed—not including old age pension outlays—totals the 1953-54 wartime record of \$5,322,300,000. Including old age pensions, total estimated government outlays for the year ending March 31 will rise to a peak \$5,874,070,310.

Fish Market Talks Said Satisfactory

HALIFAX (CP) — Trade Minister Manson said Friday that discussions he had this month with Jamaican government and trade officials on Nova Scotia's salt fish market proved "quite satisfactory." Mr. Manson returned to Halifax this week after two weeks in Jamaica and the Dominican Republic, two of Canada's biggest salt fish customers. He said that from the meetings, particularly with Trade Minister Wilfred Isaacs of Jamaica, came the hope that "we will be able to work out something on the salt fish issue that will be mutually satisfactory." Mr. Manson said that in the last 18 months Iceland has taken "a good slice" out of the Caribbean salt fish market that in 1956 was worth \$179,900,000 to Canada. Nova Scotia accounted for more than a quarter of the export value and shipped about 90 per cent of its total dried fish output to the region.
